**BALLOT**

Before voting your ballot, review the instructions and the contests and candidates on both sides of the ballot. To vote, completely darken in the box to the left of the candidate using a black or blue pen.

If you change your mind or make an error, contact the Clerk's Office for a replacement ballot. Do not use whiteout.

**ELECTION OFFENSE NOTICE**  
Pursuant to Act 235, SLH 2013, the following is a summary of provisions in HRS §§ 19-3, 19-3.5, 19-4, and 19-6 on matters associated with absentee ballot voting only. Persons interested in election offenses should consult the full text of these statutes.

Election frauds include attempting to induce, threaten, or intimidate a voter to vote, refrain from voting, or to vote in a particular way. Similarly, agreeing to be compensated is not permitted. Additionally, election fraud includes, among other things, voting or attempting to vote in the name of another person. HRS § 19-3.

Voter fraud is a class C felony and consists of, among other things, "any person who knowingly votes when the person is not entitled to vote." HRS § 19-3.5.

"Every person found guilty of an election fraud shall be fined not less than \$1,000 nor more than \$5,000, or imprisoned not more than two years, or both. Besides the punishment, the person shall be disqualified from voting and from being elected to, holding or occupying any office, elective or appointive. If the person so convicted holds any office, either elective or appointive, at the time of the conviction, the office shall at once and without mention in the sentence or other proceeding be vacated by the conviction." HRS § 19-4.

Election misdemeanors include, among other things, "any person who knowingly delivers or attempts to deliver a voted absentee ballot to a person other than the clerk of the election." HRS § 19-6.

**SECRET BALLOT ENVELOPE**

After voting your ballot, re-fold it and seal it in the secret ballot envelope. The secret ballot envelope ensures your right to secrecy as the ballots are opened and prepared for counting. Once sealed, place the secret ballot envelope in the return envelope.

**RETURN ENVELOPE**

Read the affirmation statement and sign the return envelope before returning it to the Clerk's Office. Upon receipt of your return envelope, the Clerk's Office validates the signature on the envelope. After your signature is validated your ballot will be counted.

You must sign the return envelope for your ballot to be counted.

## RETURNING YOUR VOTED BALLOT

### BY MAIL

The return envelope is postage paid via the U.S. Postal Service and addressed to your Clerk's Office. Voters returning their General Election ballot by mail (USPS) should do so by October 27. After October 27, voters should drop off their ballot to a voter service center or place of deposit.

### AT A BALLOT DROP SITE

You can return your voted ballot at a designated ballot drop site established by the Clerk's Office. This includes any voter service center in your County or directly to your Clerk's Office. Locations and hours will be available in May 2020 at elections.hawaii.gov.

**VOTED BALLOTS MUST BE

BY 7:00 PM ON ELECTION DAY.**

## ARE YOU PROPERLY REGISTERED?

You must be properly registered to ensure you receive your mail ballot packet. That means, if you have moved to a new residence, changed your name or mailing address, you must update your registration record.

## PREFER TO VOTE IN-PERSON?

You can still vote in-person at a voter service center in your County. Voter service centers are open 10-days before and on Election Day. Additional services include same day voter registration in case you missed the voter registration deadline and still want to vote.

## AWAY DURING THE ELECTION?

If you will be away from home during the elections you can request your ballot be temporarily sent to an alternate mailing address for the Primary Election, General Election, or both. Complete an [Absentee Application](#) and submit it to your Clerk's Office no later than 7-days prior to the Election.
