Pursuant to HRS §92-7 and HAR §3-170, please place the following action item on the October 1, 2025 Elections Commission agenda. Given the Sunshine Law's six-calendarday notice requirement, this request is time-sensitive and should be docketed and posted without delay so the public may testify and commissioners can deliberate.

Requested Agenda Item

Title: Discrepancy in Hawai'i County Mail-in Ballot Envelope Counts; USPS BRM Postage Accountability; Possible HAVA Compliance Issues Summary/Background (for agenda packet):

- County of Hawai'i records (drop box logs + USPS Business Reply Mail receipts) document 57,553 ballot envelopes received in the 2024 General Election.
- The State's certified summary reports show 76,595 mail ballots counted for Hawai'i County, a difference of 19,042 not matched to corresponding envelopes.
- County correspondence (Jan. 8, 2025) states USPS "doesn't always provide...
 receipts" and asserts manual counts suffice; however, there is no county–USPS
 reconciliation on file, and SVRS daily envelope processing records were denied
 under UIPA.
- Centralization of chain-of-custody in SVRS (per the CEO's March 17, 2025 letter) leaves no independent county paper trail, frustrating reconciliation and public verification, and raising possible HAVA \$301–\$303 auditability and funding-use concerns (re: BRM postage for un-receipted envelopes).

Please confirm receipt and ensure this is circulated to all commissioners and included in the public packet in compliance with HRS Chapter 92.

HAR §§ 3-170-6 & 3-170-8.

To the extent your complaint relates to prior litigation those decisions speak for themselves. As for current litigation, we will not comment on it in this forum. In regard to actions of the Elections Commission, we cannot speak to them.

Finally, we would note Elections Commission complaints "shall be made in writing and must be filed within 90 days from the date of the incident or occurrence." HAR§ 3-170-7. It has been more than 90 days since both the 2022 General Election and the 2024 General Election.

FORMAL COMPLAINT TO ELECTION COMMISSION – COMPLAINT OF MALFEASANCE, MISFEASANCE, AND NONFEASANCE – COMMISSION'S REFUSAL TO PERFORM STATUTORY DUTIES AND OVERSIGHT

Dear Chair and Members of the Elections Commission,

This petition is submitted pursuant to **HAR §3-170-5**, which authorizes any person to bring matters concerning the administration of elections before the Elections Commission, and **HAR §3-170-9**, which requires the Commission to investigate such matters and, where appropriate, to hold a public hearing.

The **Commission**, not the Chief Election Officer, is the proper body to receive and consider this complaint under **HAR Chapter 3-170**. In this matter, however, both the Chief Election Officer and the Elections Commission itself are respondents. This creates an inherent conflict of interest: neither the CEO nor the Commission may serve as the gatekeeper of a complaint directed against them.

Any practice of routing petitions through the CEO for comment, or of allowing the Commission to screen out complaints about its own conduct, violates the plain requirements of **HAR §§3-170-5 and 3-170-9**. Such practices compound the very concerns of malfeasance, misfeasance, and nonfeasance documented herein.

Accordingly, this petition must be formally docketed, placed on the agenda of the next duly noticed Commission meeting, and addressed in accordance with HAR Chapter 3-170 through investigation and public hearing, without interference or pre-review by either respondent.

I. Introduction

This petition documents a sustained pattern of **malfeasance**, **misfeasance**, **and nonfeasance** by both the Commission and the CEO from 2022 through 2025. The Commission has repeatedly refused to enforce statutory duties, rescinded requests for independent oversight, and failed to act on documented complaints.

The Commission's own Permitted Interaction Group (PIG) reports of July 13 and August 27, 2025 confirmed that the 2024 election was "unverifiable" and that the Chief Election Officer did not certify the election in accordance with HRS §11-155.

II. Basis for Petition

2022 – Premature Certification & Improper Audits

- On Nov. 28, 2022, the CEO signed certificates of election for Governor and Lt. Governor while contests were pending, contrary to HRS §11-156.
- On **Dec. 5, 2022**, the Governor and Lt. Governor were inaugurated before certification, contrary to **HRS §§11-155 and 11-156**.

FORMAL COMPLAINT TO ELECTION COMMISSION – COMPLAINT OF MALFEASANCE, MISFEASANCE, AND NOFEASANCE – COMMISSION'S REFUSAL TO PERFORM STATUTORY DUTIES AND OVERSIGHT

- On **Dec. 12, 2022**, the Commission acknowledged that the election was not certified due to pending litigation.
- In 2022 audits, the CEO admitted using digital ballot scans instead of paper ballots as required by HRS §16-42(b)(3). Only one precinct race was hand-audited instead of the 27 required.
- Official observer logs for sealing, unsealing, recounts, and audits were missing certifications in 40–80% of cases, violating HRS §§11-108, 11-152, 11-154, 16-45 and HAR §§3-177-704 et seq.

2024 - Failures to Investigate and Rescissions of Oversight

- On **Jan. 16, 2024**, the Commission considered but did not pass a motion to investigate ballot chain of custody.
- On Mar. 19, 2024, the Commission again considered but did not pass a motion to investigate ballot chain of custody.
- On Aug. 27, 2024, the Commission considered but did not pass a motion to advise the CEO to certify elections in accordance with HRS §11-155.
- Aug. 27, 2024 The Commission requested a DAG opinion on how the CEO could sign certificates of election before certification.
- **Dec. 18, 2024** The Chair ruled **moot** a request for a DAG opinion on ballot constitutionality, and the Commission **rescinded** (i) the **Aug. 27, 2024** DAG-opinion request on **certificate-before-certification**, and (ii) a DAG-opinion request on the CEO's authority to change voting methods.

2025 - Continued Failures and Confirmation of Violations

- On Jan. 15, 2025, the Commission considered but did not pass a motion to investigate ballot chain of custody; it also failed to receive and discuss correspondence complaints, contrary to HAR §3-170-5.
- On Mar. 19, 2025, the Commission again failed to receive and discuss correspondence complaints and considered but did not pass a new motion to request a DAG opinion on how the CEO could sign certificates before certification.
- On Jul. 13, 2025, the Kaua'i PIG confirmed chain-of-custody violations, including a 661-ballot discrepancy, and concluded Kaua'i did not comply with HAR §3-177-453.
- On Aug. 27, 2025, the statewide PIG concluded that the 2024 election was "unverifiable" and that the CEO did not certify the election in accordance with HRS §11-155.

III. Questions Presented

- 1. Does the Commission's repeated decision not to pass motions to investigate ballot chain of custody (2024–25) constitute nonfeasance under **HRS §19-3(8)**, which defines election fraud as willful failure to perform duties required by law?
- 2. Does the Commission's decision not to pass a motion affirming certification in accordance with HRS §11-155 (Aug. 2024) constitute malfeasance by failing to enforce a statutory requirement?

- 3. Do the rescissions of DAG opinion requests (Dec. 2024, Mar. 2025) constitute misfeasance by blocking independent legal review of statutory duties?
- 4. Do the Commission's failures to receive and consider correspondence complaints (Jan. and Mar. 2025) violate **HAR §3-170-5** and constitute systemic nonfeasance?
- 5. In light of the Commission's own PIG findings that the 2024 election was **unverifiable** and unlawfully uncertified, how can the Commission justify its prior failures without acknowledging misconduct?

IV. Request for Action

Pursuant to HAR §3-170-9(c), I respectfully request that the Commission:

- Remove the Chief Election Officer under HRS §11-7.5, for maladministration and repeated statutory violations.
- Refer these matters to the Attorney General for investigation under HRS §19-3(8).
- 3. **Hold a public hearing** to receive evidence and testimony concerning the Commission's failures to investigate, its rescission of oversight motions, and the statutory consequences of certifying unverifiable elections.
- 4. **Adopt formal findings** identifying the Commission's own failures including:
 - Refusal to investigate chain of custody (Jan. 2024, Mar. 2024, Jan. 2025),
 - Failure to affirm certification standards under HRS §11-155 (Aug. 2024), and
 - Rescission of DAG opinions on ballot constitutionality, voting method, and certificate authority (Dec. 2024, Mar. 2025).

These findings must:

- Acknowledge that the Commission's actions and inactions contributed to unlawful certification of the 2022 and 2024 elections,
- Be transmitted to the Attorney General and the Legislature for further investigation into the Election Commission's complicity in violations of HRS §19-3(8), and
- **Implement corrective measures** to prevent recurrence, including mandatory enforcement of chain-of-custody requirements and certification procedures, and the establishment of *independent oversight* to monitor future compliance.

V. Conclusion

The Elections Commission's pattern of inaction from 2022 through 2025 — including premature certification, unlawful audits, refusal to investigate chain of custody, rescission of oversight, and failure to receive complaints — demonstrates sustained **malfeasance**, **misfeasance**, **and nonfeasance**.

FORMAL COMPLAINT TO ELECTION COMMISSION – COMPLAINT OF MALFEASANCE, MISFEASANCE, AND NOFEASANCE – COMMISSON'S REFUSAL TO PERFORM STATUTORY DUTIES AND OVERSIGHT

The Commission's own PIG reports now confirm that the 2024 election was both **unverifiable** and **not certified in accordance with statute.**

Continued inaction places the Commission itself in violation of HRS §19-3(8).

Accordingly, I respectfully demand immediate action.

2024 General Election – Hawai'i County Mail Ballot Envelope Discrepancy and USPS Business Reply Mail (BRM) Postage

Statement of Jurisdiction

This complaint is filed under Section 402 of the Help America Vote Act of 2002 (42 U.S.C. §15512) and HAR Chapter 3-170. Hawai'i, as a recipient of federal HAVA funds, is required to maintain an administrative complaint procedure to resolve alleged violations of Title III of HAVA.

Statement of Facts

- Official Hawai'i County records show 57,553 ballot envelopes collected in the 2024 General Election (drop box + USPS BRM receipts).
- 2. The State's certified report for Hawai'i County shows 76,595 ballots counted.
- 3. This leaves a discrepancy of 19,042 ballots unaccounted for by envelopes.
- 4. In an email dated January 8, 2025, Hawai'i County Elections Program Administrator Cori Saiki admitted: "USPS doesn't always provide us with receipts which is the difference in the envelope count you are inquiring about."
- A UIPA request for daily SVRS envelope processing logs was denied by the Office of Elections.
- 6. A UIPA request for correspondence between the County and USPS produced no records, confirming no reconciliation was attempted.

- 7. On March 17, 2025, the Chief Election Officer wrote to the Commission that counties no longer maintain their own chain-of-custody forms, and that the SVRS itself is the "form." This means there are no independent county records.
- 8. Without USPS receipts for 19,042 envelopes, the County may also have failed to reimburse USPS for postage — raising concerns of misuse of federal HAVA funds.

Legal Basis

- HAVA Section 301(a)(2)(B) & 301(a)(5): Requires voting systems to provide a permanent paper record and be auditable. The missing envelopes and absence of independent records prevent reconciliation.
- HAVA Section 303(a)(1)(A): Requires accurate statewide registration lists coordinated with local officials. Eliminating county chain-of-custody records undermines this requirement.
- Federal funding conditions: HAVA funds may be used for ballot postage. Failure to account for USPS BRM receipts suggests possible misuse of funds.

Relief Requested

- 9. An investigation into the 19,042-ballot discrepancy in Hawai'i County.
- 10. Production of all USPS BRM invoices, billing statements, and reconciliation records for 2024.
- 11. Production of SVRS daily envelope processing totals for the same election.
- 12. Restoration of independent county-level chain-of-custody documentation.
- 13. An audit to ensure USPS was reimbursed for all returned ballot envelopes.
- 14. That this matter be docketed on the next Elections Commission meeting agenda and all complaint documents distributed to commissioners and made available to the public.

Request for Hearing

Complainant requests a hearing on the record, with the opportunity to present evidence and cross-examine, as required by Section 402 of HAVA.

The BRM receipts you reviewed were provided to us by USPS. USPS doesn't always provide us with receipts which is the difference in the envelope count you are inquiring about. Our office manually counts all election envelopes received daily via USPS, drop boxes, email, and voter service centers. Be assured we can account for all envelopes we receive.

On another note, envelope counts will never match with the state's summary report. The summary report is ballots counted. Envelopes opened at counting center may come in empty, with more than one ballot in an envelope, or contain a wrong election ballot (primary ballot in a general election envelope) which will all play a part in the reconciliation process.

Dear Chair Curtis and Members of the Elections Commission:

Our office has heard various concerns related to the handling of ballots by the county clerks prior to their receipt at our State counting center. They have come in the form of lawsuits, correspondence with our office, and correspondence with the Elections Commission taking issue with various aspects of what these concerns term "chain of custody." In response, our office would like to provide an overview of the roles of the Office of Elections and county clerks, and the associated transfer of materials from the county to the State.

ROLES OF THE OFFICE OF ELECTIONS AND THE COUNTY CLERKS

The roles and responsibilities in the administration of elections in Hawaii are divided between State and county offices.

The Office of Elections is a State agency administratively attached to the Department of Accounting and General Services that provides support to the Chief Election Officer. See HRS § 11-1.5. As provided for in Article IV, Section 3, of the Hawaii State Constitution, the Legislature has established specific statutory responsibilities of the Chief Election Officer that are found in Title 2, HRS.

At the county level, there are the county clerks who are appointed by their respective county councils and have duties and responsibilities based on their county charters, along with specific state laws, a significant portion of which involve the conduct of elections.

The regularly scheduled primary election and general election are considered combined federal, state, and county elections in which federal, state, and county contests, along with questions, appear on the same ballot. Since 2020, all elections are

required to be conducted by mail, with accommodations for voting in person at designated voter service centers. See HRS §§ 11-101 and 11-109.

The duties and responsibilities of the Office of Elections and county clerks in these types of elections are primarily summarized in HRS §§ 11-110(b)(1)(A) & (B). Specifically, "[t]he counties shall be responsible for voter registration, absentee voting, voter service centers, places of deposit, and the mailing and receipt of ballots," while "[t]he State shall be responsible for the printing and counting of ballots. *Id.* The counting of ballots occurs at State counting centers operated by the Office of Elections. *See* HRS § 16-41. One of the benefits of the roles and responsibilities of election officials being divided is that it naturally establishes checks and balances of the processes such that there is no single entity completing all tasks and reconciliation.

As an example, the counties receive, validate, and track return identification envelopes, from voters using the statewide voter registration system. From there, the validated return identification envelopes are transferred to the State-operated counting center to open, process, and count. As voted ballots are processed at the counting center, our office compares the number of return envelopes accounted for in the statewide voter registration system to the number of voted ballots counted by the voting system.

II. TRANSFER BETWEEN COUNTY AND STATE

As provided for in HRS § 11-102, election officials "mail a ballot package by non-forwardable mail to each registered voter[,]" except for those who are "identified as having an outdated or non-deliverable mailing address." The ballot package itself includes: (1) the ballot, (2) return identification envelope; and (3) secrecy sleeve. Voters are also able to choose to vote at a voter service center. See HRS § 11-109.

The statewide voter registration system tracks the issuance of ballots for both mail and in-person voting. In terms of mail voting, the return identification envelope includes a barcode with a unique identifier associated with each voter. Return identification envelopes are scanned by the county clerks as part of the validation process and the statewide voter registration system is updated to reflect the receipt of the return identification envelopes. The system can also track other situations. For example, it can track if a previously validly issued ballot needs to be invalidated, such as when a voter changes address and requires a new ballot associated with the contests in their new community to be issued to them and the previously issued ballot to be invalidated.

For in-person voting, the issuance of a ballot to a voter at a voter service center is tracked by the statewide voter registration system. The voter directly casts the ballot in the voting machine, which scans it and drops it into a secure ballot box. Ballots issued at a voter service center are simultaneously considered received for purposes of the statewide voter registration system in terms of crediting the voter with having voted.

This tracking mechanism in the statewide voter registration system effectuates the language of HAR § 3-177-453(b) (i.e. "The clerk shall maintain a complete and current count of all marksense ballots issued, spoiled, and received in their county. The accounting of marksense ballots by the clerk shall be recorded on forms prescribed by the chief election officer). In other words, the "form" is electronic in that the county clerks interact with the statewide voter registration system for purposes of tracking the issuance, receipt, and spoiling of ballots.

The validated return identification envelopes are transferred by the county clerks to the State for purposes of opening and counting at the State counting center, along with the ballots that were already processed by the voting machines at the voter service centers. The amount of return identification envelopes and voter service center ballots are known values due to the previously mentioned statewide voter registration system that the county clerks interact with to track the ballots.

While the transfer of return identification envelopes and voter service center ballots is the responsibility of the county clerks, we seek to work collaboratively with their offices to conduct honest and efficient elections. As an outline, first, the county clerks secure the voted materials (e.g., return identification envelopes, voted ballot containers). Second, they transfer these items using Official Observers as witnesses to the State counting center. This typically involves a handoff at the county clerk's office to a team of election officials and Official Observers who take custody of the items.

To emphasize, the counties know the exact number of ballots transferred to the counting center, due to the previously noted statewide voter registration system. In terms of the documentation of the transfer, each county does it in their own way (e.g. some additionally indicate in their documentation the number of envelopes in their documentation, while others do not). The documentation itself consists of either the counties using the State's multi-purpose Certification of Sealing/Unsealing form, which

is a form used within the State's counting center, or creating its own paperwork to accompany the ballots.¹

At the counting center, the return identification envelopes are opened, and the voted ballots are scanned by the vote counting system and securely stored. However, this does not apply to those having invalid ballot conditions. Invalid ballot conditions which stop a ballot from being counted, such as the envelope or secrecy sleeve is returned without a ballot or the voter returned two voted ballots (e.g. two household members accidentally enclose both of their ballots in a single return identification envelope) are tracked. Ballots invalidated at the counting center are not counted and are securely maintained by the Office of Elections.

2024 General Election Seal Certification Forms

The documents related to the transfer of ballots from the county clerks to our State counting centers are enclosed.

The County of Hawaii used the State's Certification of Sealing/Certification of Unsealing form to transfer materials to the State counting center. The form is a multipurpose form that can be used for various containers and associated content. The Certification of Sealing/Certification of Unsealing documents reflect the documents that a reasonable search of our records have produced that could have been used in connection with the transfer of ballots from the county to the State counting center. All of them have been provided, and they have been bates stamped HAWAII 001 to HAWAII 114.

The County of Maui used the State's Certification of Sealing/Certification of Unsealing form to transfer materials to the State counting center. The form is a multipurpose form that can be used for various containers and associated content. The Certification of Sealing/Certification of Unsealing documents reflect the documents that a reasonable search of our records have produced that could have been used in

connection with the transfer of ballots from the county to the State counting center. All of them have been provided, and they have been bates stamped MAUI 001 to MAUI 036.

Our review of these documents reflected that some of the documents concerning the transfer of validated mail ballots, as opposed to voter service center ballots, that we expected to see were not present and may have been misplaced due to human error. We contacted the County of Maui, and it confirmed the process by which it would use the Certification of Sealing/Certification of Unsealing document each time it sealed validated return identification envelopes for transfer. Likewise, we confirmed with counting center staff that they unsealed the containers and filled out the Certification of Sealing/Certification of Unsealing forms as they had in prior elections. The forms ultimately should have been placed in the cut seals envelope, but our search of those envelopes does not reflect the forms.

We would emphasize that this human error appears to have resulted from the volume of forms and documents handled in the course of the election and is not indicative of a systemic issue or breach in the security of the ballots. Election processes are purposefully layered for redundancies. In this and all instances related to the security of the handling of the return envelopes, the county clerks maintain a record of the number of envelopes accepted through the statewide voter registration system on a regular (e.g., daily) basis. Likewise, our office tracks the number of voted ballots counted by the voting system on the dates of counting.

The County of Kauai used their own forms for the transfer of mail ballots, while using the State's Certification of Sealing/Certification of Unsealing forms for voted ballots from the voter service centers. As such, the county created forms, and all of the Certification of Sealing/Certification of Unsealing forms have been provided. They have been bates stamped KAUAI 001 to KAUAI 023.

The City and County of Honolulu used their own forms for the transfer of mail ballots and voter service center ballots. They have been bates stamped CITY 001 to CITY 159. The documentation of ballots associated with the transfer of mail ballots involved two forms. The first is their seal certification form. To the extent the form indicated a security cage or another container held uncounted ballots from its AIPA location, there was a corresponding form entitled "Mail Ballot Transfer Form," which would repeat the name of the container, indicate the number trays, and state the number of envelopes. This would be followed by a sheet of paper indicating each individual tray and how many envelopes were in each tray. Otherwise, the seal certification form was used to transfer voted ballots from its voter service centers. The form would indicate if the location was Honolulu Hale, Kapolei Hale, Kaneohe District

Park, or Wahiawa District Park. Please note that in relation to Seal No. 2456635 (CITY 156 to CITY 159), while it was originally sealed using the City's form, the unsealing of it was documented on the State's form. Otherwise, the unsealing of the City's ballots at the State counting center was done using the original form that had been used to document the initial sealing.

2024 General Election Over/Under Report

Throughout the election, officials regularly track the number of return identification envelopes accounted for in the statewide voter registration system and the number of voted ballots counted by the vote counting system. The final reconciliation, or the Over/Under Report, of the 2 systems is compiled after each election in relation to the certification of the results. The 2024 General Election Over/Under Report is enclosed.

The reconciliation process in which we compare the number of ballots received and validated by the county clerks as documented in the statewide voter registration system against the number of ballots our office counted is one of the safeguards we follow to ensure chain of custody — or the handling, accounting, and security of the ballots. The information in the statewide voter registration system as to who voted is supported by the signed return identification envelopes for all voters who voted by mail and the in-person applications signed by all voters who voted in person. Likewise, the election results are supported by the actual ballots that have been preserved. We would note that the accounting of mail ballots is adjusted to address invalid ballot conditions that were recorded during the ballot opening process at the State counting centers.

As a summary of the 2024 General Election Over/Under report, the table below provides a cumulative comparison on the number of return envelopes received by the county clerk (i.e., Adj. Mail Total, Walk Turnout) as compared to the number of ballots counted at the State-operated counting centers (i.e., Mail Prec. Report, In-Person Prec. Report):

III. CONCLUSION

Recently, the issue of election integrity has been raised by some who allege what they see as "chain of custody" concerns. The processes by which Hawaii election officials maintain "chain of custody" come in many shapes and forms, all of which have merit and credibility. Our election officials, at all levels, work with the utmost integrity and dignity to ensure secure and accurate elections.

Among the allegations is a concern that there is a lack of transparency in the transfer of materials from the county to the State. However, any discussion regarding any alleged risks or opportunities for tampering with our elections first requires an understanding of how our elections operate and the procedures and safeguards that are in place. For example, when someone seeks to review and challenge a single process in isolation, they might not appreciate that the election has to be viewed in totality and that a check may already have been applied or will be conducted later in the process to address the issue they are concerned about. The layered safeguards and intentional checks election officials implement as part of their election processes are meant to work together to prevent and identify issues.

These processes include division of responsibilities between the county clerk and State Office of Elections as well as the tracking, accounting for, and securing ballots by hundreds of county and State election officials and volunteers, statewide. As we strive for excellence with each election, we will continue to work with the county clerks to refine the process of transferring materials between entities.

Finally, we would emphasize that there are provisions to file election contests with the Hawaii Supreme Court to resolve anomalies that challenge the accuracy and integrity of the results. Specifically, complaints in such cases are required to "set forth any cause of causes, such as but not limited to, provable fraud, overages, or underages, that could cause a difference in the election results." See HRS §11-172. Allegations regarding "chain of custody" must necessarily allege provable fraud, overages, or underages that could cause a difference in the election results.

It is our understanding that the Elections Commission has no jurisdiction to decide alleged violations of the Help America Vote Act. Given this, the Elections Commission is not the proper venue for your complaint.

Re: Notice of Concern and Request for Commission Action - Hawai'i County 2024 General Election Mail-Ballot Reconciliation; other issues

Dear Commissioners:

We are very concerned about issues pertaining to the state of Hawaii's 2024 election. Election Watch, Inc. has reviewed records, your state's election data and field notes pertaining to the 2024 election. Based on the combined record thus far, we request that the Commission direct a formal, on-the-record reconciliation of Hawai'i County's 2024 General Election mail-ballot administration and resolve the custodianship disputes that have frustrated transparency.

1) What the official record shows:

- Statewide certified "REGISTRATION & TURNOUT" lists: TOTAL REGISTRATION 860,868; TOTAL TURNOUT 522,236 (60.7%); MAIL 483,078 (56.1%); IN-PERSON 39,158 (4.5%).
- EAC/EAVS submission by your state for 2024 reports 765,998 Active registrants, 522,236 ballots cast 68.2% turnout of Active (49.6% of CVAP 1,053,254).
- County of Hawai'i certified results list: MAIL TURNOUT 76,595; IN-PERSON 7,091.

• State Over/Under table (Mar. 17, 2025) states mail accounting is "adjusted to address invalid ballot conditions" recorded during opening; for Hawai'i County the table shows: Adjusted Mail 76,587; Mail Precinct 76,595 (delta +8). The same letter notes transfer-form gaps for Maui and variation in documentation across counties, and asserts counties know the exact number transferred via SVRS.

2) What County spreadsheets/logs show:

- County summary spreadsheet totals: POD/VSC 27,912; USPS (three BRM streams) 29,641; ALL CHANNELS 57,553 return-ID envelopes. (Election Day 11/05: POD/VSC 8,336; USPS 433; Total 8,769.) There is a gap of 19,042 pertaining to the absentee mailin envelopes to ballots cast.
- Route sheets for places of deposit and voter service centers exist; USPS BRM monthly statements/receipts exist; however, the daily SVRS "accepted" counts have not been provided to the public.

3) Why the 19,042 gap matters - and why it cannot be resolved without SVRS and manifests:

- 76,595 (State mail ballots counted) 57,553 (County envelopes across POD/VSC + USPS) = 19,042. The State explains that mail accounting is 'adjusted' for invalid conditions during opening, but those adjustments can only reduce the number of envelopes that yield ballots they cannot increase the number of physical envelopes collected after the fact.
- The public has been ping-ponged between agencies: the Office of Elections denied daily SVRS acceptance counts and told requesters to ask the County; requesters report the County has pointed back to the State as SVRS administrator. This is an accountability and uniform-administration problem the Commission must resolve for the citizens of your state, but of course 2024 was a federal election thus it effects all USA voters.
- Commission-level action is required to obtain: (a) USPS PostalOne!/BRM daily piece counts; (b) POD/VSC intake logs by location and date; (c) any email-return logs if used; (d) SVRS daily accepted/rejected counts with reason codes; (e) opening-stage invalid-condition tallies; and (f) County—State transfer manifests that tie SVRS batches to physical handoffs. Only then can the State's 76,587/76,595 figures be tied to the County's 57,553 envelope total.

4) Requested Commission actions:

- A. Custodianship determination and production order. Within 10 days, we ask for you to identify the definitive custodian(s) for SVRS daily acceptance data and County→State transfer manifests for the 2024 General (Hawai'i County). And to issue orders compelling production from the proper office(s).
- B. To please produce an audit-ready, day-by-day ledger for Oct 1–Nov 30, 2024 (CSV/XLSX), containing at minimum:
- Envelopes received by channel (USPS/BRM; POD/VSC by location; any email returns if used);
 - SVRS 'accepted' and 'rejected' counts with reason-code tallies;
- Opening/verification invalid-condition counts (empty, wrong ballot/election, signature mismatch, multiple ballots, etc.);
- Transfer/chain-of-custody manifests (date/time; origin/destination; container/tray/seal IDs; counts; releasing/receiving initials), cross-walked to SVRS batch IDs and any opening/scan batches;
- A tie-out worksheet proving: (USPS + POD/VSC + any other channels) \rightarrow SVRS accepted \rightarrow ballots opened \rightarrow ballots counted, with a narrative for the +8 mail delta.
- C. USPS source records. Direct the production of PostalOne!/BRM daily piece counts and monthly statements for the Elections BRM account(s) covering the election window, including any adjustments or late postings.
- D. Physical-envelope inspection protocol. Authorize a supervised inspection (or statistically valid sample) of the 76,595 Hawai'i County return-ID envelopes with PII redactions, to verify that physical inventory corresponds to SVRS acceptance and opening logs.
- E. Statewide compliance plan (Title III). Adopt a uniform template for acceptance and transfer documentation with required SVRS batch IDs on every handoff; standardize retention (≥22 months); and publish a post-election reconciliation timeline and report for the next federal election.
- F. Public reporting. Given the \sim 19,000 gap, it would be very prudent to publish the reconciliation ledger and a plain-language summary within 45 days of this letter, and keep the Commission, and public, apprised of progress at each monthly meeting until closure.

5) Preservation and rolling production:

Please preserve all records reasonably related to these subjects, including SVRS acceptance logs, POD/VSC route sheets, USPS BRM data, opening/verification logs, transfer manifests, certification files, and related communications. Begin rolling production of readily retrievable items while more complex items are compiled. There is also the issue of other counties in Hawaii not saving election records, data, of a federal election. We'd appreciate an explanation as to why this is the case with those counties.

We are available to confer on formats and field definitions and offer to help. It would be appreciated for you to provide a written response within 14 days indicating the actions the Commission will undertake and the timetable for production. If you have an explanation, with documents, to clear up these issues that would be great. Our data people and attorneys will look them over promptly.

BEFORE THE STATE OF HAWAII OFFICE OF ELECTIONS HAVA TITLE III ADMINISTRATIVE COMPLAINT (52 U.S.C. § 21112)

<u>Complainants:</u> i. Election Watch, Inc., ii. and Peter Bernegger a qualified elector, taxpayer and citizen of the United States of America.

Respondents: i. State of Hawaii Elections Commission,

- ii. Chief Election Officer Michael Curtis in his Official Capacity,
- iii. County of Hawai'i (also known as "Hawaii County") Official: County Clerk of the County of Hawai'i, Elections Division,
- iv. County of Maui Official: County Clerk of the County of Maui, Elections Division,
- v. City and County of Honolulu (official name for Oahu) Official: City Clerk of the City and County of Honolulu, Elections Division.

I. JURISDICTION AND PROCEDURE

This sworn administrative complaint is filed under Section 402 of the Help America Vote Act of 2002 (HAVA), 52 U.S.C. § 21112, alleging multiple violations of Title III requirements stemming from the administration of the 2024 General Election in the State of Hawaii, and also its named counties. The violations detailed herein demonstrate systemic failures in maintaining accurate voter registration databases, ensuring uniform election administration, and preserving essential election records as required by federal law.

Complainants request a formal hearing, comprehensive investigation, expedited review given the federal implications, and a final determination within 90 days or such other period permitted by law with Complainants' consent. Additionally, Complainants seek immediate interim relief including preservation orders, appointment of a fully independent investigator, and appropriate corrective action with prospective compliance measures to prevent recurrence of these violations.

II. STATEMENT OF HARM

The violations alleged herein directly harm Complainant's fundamental rights to transparent and auditable elections, undermine public confidence in electoral integrity, and create unequal treatment of voters across Hawaiian counties. The inability to reconcile physical ballot envelopes with electronic voting records affects not only Hawai'i voters but, given this was a federal election, impacts the integrity of national electoral processes and the rights of all United States citizens to fair and accurate elections. Fully incorporating all of this complaint within this statement, including the Exhibits.

Complainant(s): Election Watch, Inc., a 501(c)(3) nonprofit corporation organized under Wisconsin law and qualified to conduct activities in Hawaii, by and through its President Peter Bernegger. (collectively, "Complainants"). As a 501(c)(3) focused on election integrity, the organization is having its mission is directly impaired by the violations; its Officers/Directors are affected voters where the same votes in the 2024 federal election (President, Vice President) went into the same bucket; it has expended resources investigating these issues; the violations frustrate its tax-exempt purposes to have accurate, fair and honest elections. The hiding, destruction and apparently the non-existence of records of the 2024 election hinder its ability to analyze data to carry out its mission to inform the public and government officials of issues in elections. Fully incorporating all of this complaint within this statement, including the Exhibits.

III. SUMMARY OF VIOLATIONS

The State of Hawai'i's own records reveal an irreconcilable discrepancy of 19,042 mail ballot envelopes in Hawai'i County's 2024 General Election - representing nearly twenty-five percent of all reported mail ballots for the county. This massive gap between physical envelope collections documented by the County (57,553 envelopes) and mail ballots reportedly counted by the State (76,595 ballots) cannot be explained by any legitimate electoral process, as the State itself acknowledges that there exists no legal mechanism by which the count of physical return-ID envelopes can increase after County collection. Complainants allege several thousand votes, possibly as many as ~19,000, were injected into the election. The

19,042 is for now an unreconciled Title III reconciliation gap. Complainants ask for §402/§303 remedies (records, batch-to-manifest crosswalks, a formal reconciliation, and a compliance plan).

The State's attempted explanation - that mail ballot accounting is "adjusted to address invalid ballot conditions recorded during the opening process" - is mathematically impossible, as such adjustments can only decrease, never increase, the number of ballots counted from envelopes collected. The State's Over/Under table shows only an 8-ballot discrepancy for Hawai'i County (Adjusted Mail 76,587 versus Mail Precinct Report 76,595), which cannot account for the 19,042-envelope gap documented in the County's own collection records.

Compounding this numerical impossibility, the State and County have engaged in a deliberate pattern of obstruction, with each entity directing public records requesters to the other in an endless loop that prevents any meaningful verification of the election results. In particular Chairman Michael Curtis, where citizens/voters look to him to ensure open, transparent, honest and fair elections. When citizens request daily Statewide Voter Registration System (SVRS) acceptance counts from the Office of Elections, they receive Notice to Requester #1360 directing them to county clerks. When the same data is requested from county clerks, requesters are directed back to the State as the SVRS administrator. This coordinated deflection violates HAVA's requirements for transparent, uniform, and auditable election administration. Chairman Curtis could have resolved this quickly, yet instead has not taken action.

IV. DETAILED FACTUAL BACKGROUND

The official statewide certified results show Total Registration of 860,868, Total Turnout of 522,236 (60.7%), Mail ballots of 483,078 (56.1%), and In-Person voting of 39,158 (4.5%). The State's submission to the Election Assistance Commission (EAC) through the Election Administration and Voting Survey (EAVS) reported 765,998 Active registrants with 522,236 ballots cast, indicating a 68.2% turnout of Active voters and 49.6% of Citizen Voting Age Population.

For Hawai'i County specifically, the certified results list Mail Turnout of 76,595 and In-Person Turnout of 7,091. These figures form the basis of the certified election

results that determined federal, state, and local offices. The accuracy and verifiability of these numbers is therefore essential to electoral integrity and public confidence in democratic processes. If any of these figures, or any throughout this complaint, are incorrect Complainants respectfully ask the Respondents to provide a correction.

The County of Hawai'i's Elections Division maintains detailed collection logs for all mail ballot return channels. According to the County's January 7, 2025 email to the County Council, which transmitted comprehensive drop-box and USPS collection summaries, there were exactly 57,553 mail-in ballot envelopes collected by the County of Hawai'i through all channels combined. This figure derives from meticulous documentation including Places of Deposit (POD) and Voter Service Center (VSC) route sheets totaling 27,912 envelopes, and United States Postal Service Business Reply Mail (BRM) receipts documenting 29,641 envelopes across three BRM streams.

The mathematical impossibility becomes stark when examining Election Day totals from November 5, 2024. The County's logs show POD/VSC collections of 8,336 envelopes and USPS deliveries of 433 envelopes, totaling 8,769 for that crucial day. If a 19,042-envelope injection had occurred, it would require more than doubling the Election Day volume without any documentation, witnesses, or physical evidence - a scenario that defies both logic and the extensive security protocols surrounding election administration.

The State's March 17, 2025 letter to the Elections Commission attempts to explain discrepancies through "invalid ballot conditions recorded during the opening process," claiming that mail accounting is "adjusted" for such conditions. However, this explanation fails basic mathematical scrutiny. Invalid conditions at opening - such as empty envelopes, wrong ballots, signature mismatches, or multiple ballots in one envelope - can only reduce the number of valid ballots extracted from collected envelopes. No opening-stage process can retroactively create additional physical envelopes that were not initially collected and documented by the County.

The State's letter also contains troubling admissions about systematic documentation failures. Expected transfer forms from Maui were not present and "may have been misplaced due to human error." Honolulu and Kaua'i counties used their own non-standard forms rather than uniform documentation. The State acknowledges that

documentation practices vary by county, directly contradicting HAVA's mandate for uniform and nondiscriminatory administration of federal elections.

Most critically, no transfer logs documenting the chain of custody from County to State counting center for Hawai'i County have been produced despite multiple public records requests. These manifests, required by law to establish the integrity of ballot handling, would show batch identifications, container seal numbers, timestamps, and signatures of releasing and receiving officials. Their absence represents not merely an administrative oversight but a fundamental breach of election security protocols and federal record retention requirements.

The SVRS, which the State claims as its authoritative ledger for tracking accepted ballots, remains inaccessible to public verification. The State's Notice to Requester #1360 dated April 1, 2025, explicitly denies disclosure of daily SVRS accepted counts, citing HRS §92F-13(3),(4) and directing requesters to county clerks. Yet when others have requested this same SVRS data from the Hawai'i County Clerk, they are told that the State Office of Elections is the SVRS administrator and custodian of such records. This circular misdirection has continued for months, effectively preventing any independent verification of the State's reconciliation claims.

Further investigation reveals that other Hawaiian counties failed to maintain basic election records entirely. Maui and Oahu counties reportedly did not keep drop box collection records for a federal election, a stunning admission that violates federal record retention requirements under 52 U.S.C. § 20701-20702, which mandates preservation of all records relating to federal elections for twenty-two months. The Respondents may wish to provide full and complete transparency right now; they fail to realize deleting federal election records, and/or other issues laid out in this complaint, can be seen as felony criminal acts. Based on the documents Complainants have in their possession, they ask if any of these may have occurred:

-52 U.S.C. § 20701 - Retention and Preservation of Records and Papers by Officers of Elections is alleged violated. If the ~19,000 envelopes never existed, it's a violation per 52 U.S.C. § 20511 under NVRA.

V. LEGAL ANALYSIS AND VIOLATIONS

Violation 1: Failure to Maintain Accurate Statewide Voter Registration Database (52 U.S.C. § 21083)

HAVA Section 303 requires each state to implement and maintain a single, uniform, official, centralized, interactive computerized statewide voter registration list that is accurate and regularly maintained. The 19,042-envelope discrepancy between physical collections and reported vote totals demonstrates that Hawai'i's SVRS either contains fundamental inaccuracies or has been manipulated without proper documentation. When nearly twenty-five percent of a county's mail ballot totals cannot be traced to physical envelopes collected through documented channels, the database fails HAVA's accuracy requirement.

The State's reliance on SVRS as authoritative while simultaneously refusing to provide SVRS data for verification creates an un-auditable black box that violates both the letter and spirit of HAVA's database requirements. A database that cannot be verified cannot be confirmed as accurate, and a system that shows 19,042 more votes than physical envelopes collected is, by definition, inaccurate.

Violation 2: Lack of Uniform and Nondiscriminatory Administration (52 U.S.C. § 21083(a)(1)(A))

HAVA explicitly requires that statewide voter registration systems be "administered in a uniform and nondiscriminatory manner in compliance with the requirements of section 21083." The State's own admissions reveal systematic failures in uniform administration. Different counties use different transfer forms or no forms at all. Some counties maintain collection records while others do not. Documentation that should be standardized varies by county according to the State's March 17, 2025 letter.

The custodianship confusion between State and County offices regarding SVRS data access further demonstrates the absence of uniform procedures. When citizens cannot determine which office maintains required records, and when those offices point to each other in an endless loop, the system fails HAVA's uniformity requirement. This is not merely an inconvenience but a structural impediment to the transparency and accountability that federal law demands.

Violation 3: Federal Election Records Retention Violations (52 U.S.C. § 20701-20702 and 52 U.S.C. § 20507(i))

Federal law unequivocally requires retention of all records and papers relating to any application, registration, or other act requisite to voting in federal elections for twenty-two months from the date of the election. The missing transfer manifests between County and State, the absent drop box collection records from Maui and Oahu counties, and the inaccessible SVRS daily acceptance counts all constitute violations of these retention requirements.

The State cannot claim compliance with retention requirements when essential chain-of-custody documentation does not exist or cannot be produced. Transfer manifests are not optional paperwork but fundamental security documents that establish the integrity of ballot handling. Their absence or destruction before the mandatory twenty-two month period represents a federal crime under 52 U.S.C. § 20701.

Violation 4: Systematic Destruction of Federal Election Records in Maui and Oahu Counties

The scope of federal law violations extends beyond Hawai'i County to encompass a statewide pattern of illegal records destruction. Complainant has discovered that Maui and Oahu counties, which together account for the vast majority of Hawai'i's population and votes, failed to retain drop box collection records and other essential documentation from the 2024 federal election. This is not merely poor practice but a direct violation of federal criminal law under 52 U.S.C. § 20701, which mandates that "every officer of election shall retain and preserve, for a period of twenty-two months from the date of any general, special, or primary election... all records and papers which come into his possession relating to any application, registration, payment of poll tax, or other act requisite to voting in such election."

The destruction or failure to create these records in Maui and Oahu counties is particularly troubling given that these counties reported significantly higher vote totals than Hawai'i County. Oahu County, containing Honolulu and representing approximately 70% of the state's population, and Maui County, the second most populous county, have effectively made it impossible to verify the legitimacy of hundreds of thousands of ballots. When counties destroy or fail to maintain the very

records that would allow verification of ballot collection and chain of custody, they create an environment where fraud becomes undetectable and election integrity cannot be assured.

This systematic failure across multiple counties suggests coordinated action or, at minimum, statewide administrative negligence that violates HAVA's requirement for uniform election administration. The State Office of Elections, as the chief elections authority, has a duty to ensure all counties comply with federal record retention requirements. The fact that some counties maintained records while others destroyed them demonstrates a complete breakdown in statewide election administration oversight and uniformity.

The timing of this record destruction or non-retention is highly suspicious. These records should have been preserved through at least September 2026 - twenty-two months after the November 2024 election. Yet by early 2025, counties are already claiming the records don't exist. This premature destruction of federal election records may constitute willful violation of federal law, potentially rising to the level of obstruction of justice if done to prevent detection of irregularities.

The combined effect of Hawai'i County's 19,042-envelope discrepancy and the complete absence of verification records from Maui and Oahu counties means that the majority of Hawai'i's votes in the 2024 federal election cannot be properly audited or verified. This creates a constitutional crisis where the integrity of federal election results, including races for President, U.S. Senate, and U.S. House of Representatives, cannot be confirmed through documentary evidence as required by federal law.

Violation 5: Failure to Comply with HAVA Complaint Procedures (52 U.S.C. § 21112)

HAVA Section 402 requires states to establish administrative complaint procedures that include the ability to request a hearing on the record and to receive a final determination within prescribed timeframes. The State's pattern of misdirection, refusing to identify proper custodians of records, and failing to provide essential documentation frustrates the complaint process itself. When complainants cannot

access the very records necessary to document violations, the complaint procedure becomes meaningless.

VI. THE MATHEMATICAL AND LOGICAL IMPOSSIBILITY

The core of this complaint rests on an indisputable mathematical fact that the State has not and cannot explain. Physical envelopes collected and documented by the County totaled 57,553. The State certified that 76,595 mail ballots were counted from Hawai'i County. This creates a gap of 19,042 ballots - nearly one in four - that materialized without corresponding physical envelopes.

The State's explanation about adjustments for invalid ballot conditions fails basic logic. When election workers open return envelopes, they may find various invalid conditions: the envelope might be empty, contain the wrong ballot, include multiple ballots, or have signature issues. Each of these conditions reduces the number of valid ballots that can be counted from the collected envelopes. It is physically impossible for the opening process to generate additional envelopes that were not originally collected. These are all ongoing violations, in particular due to the lack of Respondents making federal election records available.

If the State contends that 76,595 mail ballots were legitimately cast, it must document the collection of at least 76,595 return envelopes through recognized channels - USPS delivery, drop box collection, or in-person return at voter service centers. The County's meticulous logs show only 57,553 envelopes collected through all channels combined. The State has provided no documentation of any additional collection channel that could account for 19,042 envelopes.

The timing analysis further exposes the impossibility. Election Day collections, when scrutiny is highest and procedures most rigorously followed, produced 8,769 envelopes county-wide. The missing 19,042 envelopes represent more than twice the entire Election Day volume. Such a massive influx would require extraordinary logistics, documentation, and personnel - none of which appears in any record produced to date.

VII. EVIDENCE OF SYSTEMIC FAILURE AND POTENTIAL MANIPULATION

The pattern of missing documentation, conflicting explanations, and bureaucratic misdirection suggests not isolated errors but systemic failure or deliberate manipulation. When transfer manifests vanish, when counties don't maintain collection records, when the State and County each claim the other has custody of critical data, and when a 19,042-envelope discrepancy emerges with no explanation, the integrity of the entire election comes into question.

Complainant has compiled extensive documentation supporting these allegations, including USPS BRM monthly statements and receipts covering the entire election period, POD/VSC route sheets and consolidation logs, the County's summary spreadsheet establishing the 57,553 total, the State's Over/Under table showing only an 8-ballot discrepancy, Notice to Requester #1360 demonstrating the State's refusal to provide SVRS data, and correspondence documenting the circular misdirection between State and County offices.

The State's defensive posture raises additional concerns, particularly when viewed in conjunction with the illegal records destruction in Maui and Oahu counties. Rather than welcoming verification to confirm the accuracy of results, the State has blocked access to data that should be readily available and contains no personally identifiable information requiring redaction. When three of four counties have either massive unexplained discrepancies (Hawai'i County) or no records at all (Maui and Oahu), the State's refusal to provide the limited documentation that allegedly exists appears to be part of a broader pattern of concealment. Daily aggregate acceptance counts from SVRS would allow independent verification of the State's claims, yet these remain hidden behind bureaucratic walls while other crucial records have been illegally destroyed.

VIII. Timeliness and continuing violations

This complaint is timely filed as it addresses ongoing and continuing violations of federal law that persist to this day. While the 2024 General Election occurred on November 5, 2024, the violations alleged herein did not become apparent until the County's January 7, 2025 disclosure of the 19,042-envelope discrepancy, and

continue through the State's ongoing refusal to provide records, as evidenced by Notice to Requester #1360 dated April 1, 2025, and subsequent denials throughout 2025.

The continuing violation doctrine applies because: (a) the State and counties continue to illegally withhold and conceal election records in violation of federal transparency requirements; (b) the destruction of records in Maui and Oahu counties constitutes an ongoing violation of the 22-month retention requirement that continues each day the records remain destroyed; (c) the State's SVRS database remains inaccurate and unverifiable, a continuing violation of HAVA's accuracy requirements; (d) the circular misdirection between State and County offices regarding record custody continues to this day, preventing verification and frustrating the complaint process; and (e) the State continues to certify and rely upon election results that cannot be mathematically reconciled, perpetuating the original violations with each official action taken in reliance on these uncorrected results.

Moreover, Complainants could not have reasonably discovered these violations until the County's January 2025 disclosure revealed the envelope discrepancy, as the State actively concealed the true condition of election records through bureaucratic obstruction. The discovery rule tolls any limitations period until the violation could reasonably have been discovered. Complainants acted diligently upon learning of the discrepancy, submitting multiple public records requests that were denied or misdirected throughout 2025, necessitating this complaint after exhausting administrative remedies. The pertinent records still have not been made available, instead covered up/withheld by one or more Respondent.

Additionally, each day that election officials fail to produce federally mandated records, maintain inaccurate voter registration databases, and refuse to reconcile the 19,042-ballot discrepancy constitutes a new and independent violation. The State cannot claim staleness when it continues to violate federal law daily through active concealment and ongoing records destruction. This complaint, filed on September 27, 2025, addresses violations occurring as recently as this month, including continued denials of access to SVRS data and ongoing failure to preserve election records.

Reviewing - Hawaii's and other Respondents' own records present a material reconciliation delta of 19,042 for Hawai'i County in the 2024 General: the County's

intake materials total 57,553 return-ID envelopes across all channels, while the State reports 76,595 mail ballots counted; the State's Over/Under lists Adjusted Mail 76,587 vs. Mail Precinct 76,595 (+8). This delta cannot be tested without daily SVRS "accepted/rejected" counts, invalid-condition tallies, and batch-to-manifest crosswalks that the State cites but has not produced. The State and other Respondents also acknowledges non-uniform documentation practices and missing transfer forms in at least one county, defeating the uniform, auditable administration HAVA §303 requires. Complainants therefore seek §402 relief ordering: (1) production of the SVRS daily aggregates and reason-code summaries; (2) production of USPS PostalOne!/BRM piece counts and all POD/VSC logs; (3) production of county→state transfer manifests with batch IDs; and (4) a Commission-supervised reconciliation tying envelopes received → SVRS accepted → opening dispositions → ballots counted, plus a statewide compliance plan to standardize documentation and retention going forward.

IX. RELIEF REQUESTED

To remedy these violations and restore public confidence in Hawai'i's elections, Complainant respectfully requests the following relief:

First, immediate production orders requiring within ten days the disclosure of all daily SVRS accepted and rejected counts for Hawai'i County mail ballot packages from October 1 through November 30, 2024, broken down by channel and including batch identifications and reason-code tallies for any rejections or invalid conditions recorded during processing.

Second, production of all USPS PostalOne! and BRM daily piece counts and monthly statements for all Hawai'i County Elections BRM accounts covering the election period, including any adjustments, corrections, or late postings that might explain discrepancies in mail ballot receipt.

Third, production of complete POD/VSC intake logs by location and date, documenting every collection from every drop box and voter service center, including timestamps, collector identifications, and seal numbers for secure transport.

Fourth, production of all County-to-State transfer manifests that should document the chain of custody for every batch of ballots moved from County custody to State counting facilities, including container identifications, seal numbers, piece counts, and signatures of releasing and receiving officials with timestamps.

Fifth, production of SVRS audit logs showing any data modifications, bulk imports, or administrative changes made to the database during the election period, particularly any entries that added accepted ballots without corresponding physical envelope receipt.

Sixth, immediate appointment of an independent investigator with forensic auditing expertise to conduct a comprehensive reconciliation analysis tying USPS receipts plus POD/VSC collections to SVRS accepted envelopes to opening dispositions to counted ballots, with a public report quantifying and explaining all discrepancies.

Seventh, a forensic audit of a statistically significant sample of the 76,595 return envelopes allegedly received from Hawai'i County to verify that physical inventory corresponds to electronic records and to identify any envelopes that lack proper documentation of their collection channel.

Eighth, sworn affidavits from all state and county election officials with knowledge of the 19,042-envelope discrepancy, explaining under penalty of perjury how mail ballots were counted without corresponding collected envelopes.

Ninth, adoption of uniform statewide transfer and acceptance protocols requiring standardized documentation with SVRS batch identifications on every transfer manifest, mandatory chain-of-custody tracking, and retention of all documents for the federally required twenty-two months.

Tenth, a public hearing within thirty days where election officials must explain these discrepancies on the record and answer questions from complainants and the public about the integrity of the 2024 election results.

Eleventh, if the investigation confirms that 19,042 ballots were counted without corresponding legally collected envelopes, appropriate remedial action including potential decertification of affected results, referral for criminal investigation, and implementation of enhanced security measures for future elections.

Twelfth, establishment of real-time public access to aggregate, non-personally-identifiable SVRS data for future elections, allowing independent verification of ballot acceptance and counting in compliance with HAVA transparency requirements.

Thirteenth, immediate federal investigation into the illegal destruction or non-retention of election records in Maui and Oahu counties, with referral to the U.S. Department of Justice for potential criminal prosecution under 52 U.S.C. § 20701, which provides for fines and imprisonment up to one year for any officer of election who willfully fails to comply with record retention requirements.

Fourteenth, an order requiring Maui and Oahu counties to immediately cease any further destruction of 2024 election materials and to produce a detailed inventory of what records were destroyed, when they were destroyed, on whose authority, and whether any copies or backups exist in any format.

Fifteenth, appointment of federal monitors for all future federal elections in Hawai'i until the State can demonstrate compliance with federal record retention requirements across all counties, as the current violations demonstrate either inability or unwillingness to follow federal law.

Sixteenth, a comprehensive audit of all four Hawaiian counties' election procedures to determine whether any election records remain that could help verify the 2024 results, including but not limited to security camera footage, employee logs, transportation records, or any other peripheral documentation that might provide insight into ballot handling.

X. PRESERVATION NOTICE

Respondents are hereby notified of their legal obligation to preserve all documents, electronic records, physical ballots, envelopes, and other materials relating to the 2024 General Election in Hawai'i County. This includes but is not limited to all SVRS data and audit logs, transfer manifests and chain-of-custody documents, USPS delivery records and BRM statements, drop box collection logs and route sheets, voter service center intake records, email communications regarding ballot

handling and counting, security camera footage from ballot processing facilities, and any other materials that might explain the 19,042-envelope discrepancy.

Destruction, alteration, or failure to preserve any such materials may constitute spoliation of evidence and federal crimes under 52 U.S.C. § 20701 and related statutes. The twenty-two month retention period has not expired, and all materials must be maintained in their current state pending resolution of this complaint.

Given the confirmed destruction of records in Maui and Oahu counties in violation of federal law, this preservation notice takes on heightened urgency. Any further destruction of election records will be considered willful spoliation and potential criminal conduct. All custodians of election records are reminded that violation of federal election record retention requirements carries criminal penalties including fines and imprisonment. The fact that some records have already been illegally destroyed makes preservation of remaining records even more critical and any further destruction even more suspicious.

XI. VERIFICATION

I declare under penalty of perjury under the laws of the United States of America that the foregoing is true and correct to the best of my knowledge, information, and belief. The facts stated herein are based on official government documents, public records properly obtained through lawful requests, and mathematical analysis of certified election results.

This complaint is filed in good faith to secure compliance with Title III of the Help America Vote Act and to ensure the integrity of federal elections. The discrepancies identified herein are not minor technical violations but fundamental breaches that call into question the validity of certified election results affecting federal offices including the President of the United States, United States Senators, and Members of Congress.

Time is of the essence in addressing these violations. Evidence may be destroyed, memories may fade, and public confidence continues to erode with each day that these discrepancies remain unexplained. Complainant therefore requests expedited consideration and immediate interim relief as specified above. Several individuals

have already come forward with information pertaining to the 2024 federal election in Hawaii. Complainants encourage more citizens and/or election officials to come forward with additional information.

Subject: Formal Complaint Regarding Violations of Election Procedures and Chain of Custody Documentation

I am writing to officially file a formal complaint concerning the handling of ballots and the violation of election laws by the Chief Election Officer (CEO). This constitutes not only a breach of statutory obligations but also compromises the integrity of the election process.

Despite multiple prior requests, the CEO failed to maintain or provide records detailing the chain of custody of the ballots. These records—including forms tracking ballot box numbers, quantities, collection points, and signatures—are mandated by law and critical for ensuring transparency, accountability, and the ability to audit the election.

Specifically:

- The CEO admitted in his March 17 2025 letter to the commissioners that the county did not possess these essential documents. He attributed this to "misplacement" of records as "human error".
- 2. I requested these documents early in the collection/counting process, and the county clerk was reminded multiple times of their legal obligation to maintain these records, specifically in the language of HAR 3-177-453 (b).
- 3. The absence of proper documentation raises serious questions about the integrity of the election, as the ballots cannot be properly reconciled or audited without this information.
- 4. HAR 3-177-453 (b) does not allow another "mechanism", as suggested in the March 17th letter, to track marksense ballots.
- 5. Human error cannot be regarded as an acceptable reason for neglecting such critical responsibilities when the stakes involve high public trust and the integrity of the electoral process.

This issue has been addressed repeatedly, yet it remains unresolved. The failure of the CEO and the Maui County clerk to adhere to legal requirements must be formally recognized and addressed. I urge the commission to include a detailed review of this matter at the upcoming meeting, and I request that appropriate actions be taken to prevent similar failures in future elections.

Thank you for your attention to this serious matter. Please acknowledge the receipt of this complaint, and please place it in the proper category of agenda materials. I look forward to your prompt response and to seeing this issue thoroughly examined in the upcoming meeting.

Dear Chair Curtis and Commissioners,

I am submitting this complaint under federal law, 52 U.S. Code § 20701, which requires every election officer to retain and preserve for twenty-two months all records and papers relating to any election involving federal offices. This includes any application, registration, or other act connected to the voting process. Federal law makes it clear that these records must be preserved for auditing and verification purposes, and that failing to do so is a criminal offense.

In his March 17, 2025 letter to the Elections Commission, Chief Election Officer Scott Nago admitted that Maui County does not have records documenting the transfer of mail ballots from the County Clerk's office to the State counting center. He explained that these records "may have been misplaced due to human error." That statement is a direct admission that official election records required by federal law are missing.

In addition to this federal requirement, Hawai'i Administrative Rule § 3-177-453(b) requires every county clerk to "maintain a complete and current count of all marksense ballots issued, spoiled, and received." Maui County has not produced any records that meet this requirement either. There are no documents showing the daily counts of envelopes received, how many ballots were issued or spoiled, or how many were transferred to the State. This means that Maui County is out of compliance not only with federal law, but also with Hawai'i's own election rules.

Without these records, it is impossible to confirm how ballots were transported from Maui County to the State counting center, or to verify the number of ballots received and counted. These are the very records that form the foundation of the certification process. It raises a serious question: how could the 2024 General Election have been certified without the legally required documentation of ballot custody and counts?

Requested Commission Action

- 1. Place this matter on the next Elections Commission agenda for public discussion.
- 2. Require the Chief Election Officer to explain how the 2024 General Election was certified without the Maui County ballot-transfer records and without any documentation meeting HAR § 3-177-453(b).
- 3. Request that the Attorney General and, if necessary, federal authorities review these apparent violations of both 52 U.S.C. § 20701 and HAR § 3-177-453(b).
- 4. Direct the Office of Elections to establish a policy ensuring all counties preserve and deposit all required records with a designated custodian for the full twenty-two-month federal retention period.

The Elections Commission's role is to ensure that Hawai'i's elections are lawful and transparent. The loss of these records from Maui County and the failure to maintain proper counts under HAR § 3-177-453(b) are serious matters that must be addressed openly and corrected before the next election cycle.

Aloha Members of the Hawaii Elections Commission, And a special greeting to Maui representatives: Dylan Andrion and James 'Kimo' Apana;

I am writing to express my deep concern that our current election procedures have come under attack—namely, by individuals who are affiliated with political organizations attempting to gain your ear, ask you manipulate our current rules, generate distrust and to eliminate Hawaii's Vote-by-Mail system. Myself and my family urge you to MAINTAIN THE INTEGRITY of our electoral process with the current Vote-by-Mail process.

The Problem: As you know, Hawaii's voter turnout was 50.3% in 2024's general election, which is lower than the national average of 64.1%. We need to continue sending yellow cards, information and ballots, encouraging all citizens to vote by increasing civic education-- not by creating obstacles to Hawaii's citizenry as we exercise our right to vote in the way we choose: by mail or in person at accessible facilities.

As you also must be aware, throughout the US, including Hawaii, there HAS NOT been any statistically significant cases of fraud found in the past eight years. I am also a dedicated Hawaii public school teacher, retired, having educated our keiki about the checks and balances of a functioning democracy; the three branches of government designed to protect and secure citizens' rights which are literally in danger at this time. I received a 'due to the federal government shutdown, your questions cannot be answered' online message—NOW MORE THAN EVER, WE NEED STATE OFFICIALS TO STAND STRONG AND CONSISTENTLY UPHOLD OUR RIGHTS.

Mahalo for your service, doing your job and duty to hold public hearings in good faith, remaining factual while investigating complaints, and ethical in your advisements to Chief Election Officer Scott Nago on matters relating to our elections, which are the singularly, most critical hallmark of our constitutional democracy. Aloha Election Commissioners,

My name is Rachel Coles. I live in Pukalani on Maui, in zip code 96768. Please consider the following testimony:

Continuing mail-in voting is critical for Hawaii residents to get a full voice in elections and for majority of Hawaii residents to be accurately represented. For the past two general elections, mail-in ballots constituted 95-6% of all votes. This is unlikely to change due to the amount of work people need to engage in to make ends meet. According to a 2020 survey, almost a quarter of residents work multiple jobs, usually the people most vulnerable to hardship from budget cuts and policy changes. This situation often functionally restricts the likelihood of voting, even with Election Day being designated sacrosanct. And 44-45,000 of Hawaii residents are active military, who have no control over deployment, for whom mail-in ballots are often critical to exercise the right to vote that they are protecting by being in the military. And 13-14,000 are reservists, whose status still may require them to be out of Hawaii during elections. In addition to this are elderly or infirm people who struggle with mobility, and who would be impacted by this.

There have been arguments about the security of mail-in ballots, but there is no data to support a security risk any higher than with in-person voting. The opposite is true. A 2020 study by the Brennan Center for Justice revealed that incidence of voter fraud by mail-in ballot was .00001%, which equals 12 votes out of 100 MILLION votes since 2000. The study found that mail-in voting was in fact more secure and less subject to interference than in-person voting. As the commission, you are familiar with the mechanical safeguards, but just to review them: The envelopes dropped into a secure box, and monitored by the USPS who has their own law enforcement, the ballots not being counted if they have been tampered with, and the envelope safeguards to ensure that any tampering is clear, the privacy of the vote protected by a security sleeve, and the signature verified and as secure as that of any credit cards. If we are not willing to trust the mail-in ballots than we should not be utilizing credit cards either. Mail-in ballots are as secure as they have ever been, and there is no credible data to support ruling out mail-in ballots on the basis of security fears.

On the other hand, cutting out the option of mail-in ballots to Hawaii residents who for multiple reasons cannot show up in person, critically deprives a significant and election changing portion of the population of Hawaii of their constitutional right to exercise their vote, and unfairly influences the outcome of any election, tilts it in favor of those with privilege who have more resources and prevents those with needs from being heard. So while no method may be foolproof, including in-person voting, not allowing mail-in ballots when so many need access to it for their right to vote is a constitutional violation, and in itself would represent a different kind of voter fraud, that of unconstitutional vote deprivation.

Aloha Elections Commission Members,

I strongly urge you to support the Hawaii VOTE BY MAIL system and to reject any attempts to undermine this system in Hawai'i. Rejecting the ability to vote by mail would seriously undermine the integrity of the Elections Commission. The ability to mail in my ballot is particularly important to me, as I am unable to stand in lines and vote in person due to a history of stroke. There are many other kapuna in my same situation who would be discouraged from voting if they had to travel to a polling location.

The hallmark of a vote-at-home elections system is the automatic delivery of ballots without voters needing to apply or submit a request. Numerous studies show that voters with ballots in hand vote at higher levels than those who have to go to a physical polling location. Ensuring they can obtain a mailed ballot without needing to worry about making a deadline or ensuring they filled out a form properly eliminates unnecessary hurdles for voters and gives them a greater opportunity to vote their ballot.

Also, providing voters postage-paid return envelopes and ballot tracking options further removes obstacles for voters and gives them confidence their mail ballot will be counted. Mail-in ballots are important because they:

- Enfranchise voters. Eliminating application requirements and simply sending all voters their ballots supports the enfranchisement of more voters because they don't need to worry about submitting an application in time. They can have confidence that their ballot will arrive to them several weeks before election day, giving them time to fill out their ballot at home and return it using a wide range of options.
- Boost turnout. Numerous studies have shown that when voters have easy access to mailed-out ballots, they vote, often at greater levels than their polling-place counterparts.
- Increase access. Finding time to get to the polls isn't always easy. With vote at home, democracy is delivered to your doorstep, without you ever having to make a request or visit a physical location if you don't want to. This is especially important to all adults (especially kapuna) with special needs and/or physical disabilities.

Please make the right decision and support the ability of Hawai'i citizens to VOTE BY MAIL.

My name is Thomas Clemens and I live in Makiki and am an employee at queens medical center. I would like to testify in support of mail in voting. My testimony relies on two different data points: firstly that mail in voting is safe/secure and that it assists many that wouldn't otherwise be able to vote.

Firstly, despite what seems to be popular to say these days, mail in voting is and has been safe and secure, with very few documented cases of fraud. To claim otherwise is either out of mistaken ignorance or malicious conspiracy.

Secondarily, I would like to testify personally that as a healthcare worker, I am unable to vote on election days. I am required to go in to work much like many other individuals, and that makes it extremely difficult to vote on election day. Early voting improves this but mail in votes makes it remarkably easier for working people who have no days off during the week to vote in every election.

In terms of accessibility, my job works with people that have mobility impairments. There are many people in Hawaii that live very far from polling places, they live in houses with multiple flights of stairs to get in/out, there are elderly people that only ever leave the house for appointments due to illness or immobility, not to mention a large number of people who are considered "bedbound" as the shorthand medical term goes, but that they are unable to even stand up to get to a wheelchair. If vote by mail is restricted or eliminated, how are these folks supposed to vote?

are their fundamental rights to vote eliminated just because they're elderly? I thought the ideas of caring for our elders was fundamental to the culture and lifestyle of hawaii, it astounds me that people would want to abandon the weak and elderly in this way.

I am in support of mail in voting in all of it's iterations, I reject the hypothesis that it is unsafe or fraudulent and instead promote the idea that it is most valuable to our most vulnerable residents

Aloha Members of the Hawai'i Elections Commission,

As a former precinct chairperson in District 13 (Huelo, Maui), I can attest to the difference that mail-in voting has made in voter turnout here in East Maui. Formerly, the physical ballots from our polling place in Huelo had to be driven 20 minutes to Haiku for pickup, then relayed to another driver to be delivered to Wailuku. The ballots from polling places from Keanae to Hana had to be driven in several relays to Haiku, then Wailuku, delaying the first printout by several hours. (I believe they were sometimes flown in from Hana Airport to Kahului, weather and time permitting). I was always impressed by the dedication of the basically unpaid polling place folks (of which I was occasionally one) who did this, usually after a 12-hour day working at the polls, not to mention the voters who had to often drive miles to get to the polling places.. Is this what we are supposed to go back to?

For many of us, mail-in voting is not only a matter of convenience—it's a matter of *democracy in action*. Having the ballot at home allows voters the time to study candidates and ballot measures carefully, to discuss them with family and friends, and to make thoughtful, informed choices. I can't count how many times my neighbors asked me for advice on voting at the polls (which, of course, I couldn't give), since this was the first time many of them had seen the ballot.

There is NO evidence of ANY fraud in Hawai'i's mail-in voting system—or anywhere else in the United States. What we are seeing now is not a good-faith effort to strengthen election integrity, but part of a coordinated national campaign driven by MAGA extremists to make voting harder, to intimidate people at the polls, and to sow distrust in democracy itself. Restricting access to mail-in ballots does not protect elections—it undermines them.

These are attempts to silence voters who may not agree with the current far-right agenda. These efforts are NOT about preventing fraud—they are about restricting access, because those pushing them know they cannot win when every eligible voter has the opportunity to cast a ballot.

I urge you to stand firm in protecting Hawai'i's mail-in voting system and to reject any attempt to roll it back. We must not allow national partisan tactics to erode the trust and fairness that Hawai'i's voters have built together over decades.

For the past two general elections, mail-in ballots constituted 95-6% of all votes. This is unlikely to change due to the amount of work people need to engage in to make ends meet. According to a 2020 survey, almost a quarter of residents work multiple jobs, usually the people most vulnerable to hardship from budget cuts and policy changes. This situation often functionally restricts the likelihood of voting, even with Election Day being designated sacrosanct. And 44-45,000 of Hawaii residents are active military, who have no control over deployment, for whom mail-in ballots are often critical to exercise the right to vote that they are protecting by being in the military. And 13-14,000 are reservists, whose status still may require them to be out of Hawaii during elections. In addition to this are elderly or infirm people who struggle with mobility, and who would be impacted by this.

There have been arguments about the security of mail-in ballots, but there is no data to support a security risk any higher than with in-person voting. The opposite is true. A 2020 study by the Brennan Center for Justice revealed that incidence of voter fraud by mail-in ballot was .00001%, which equals 12 votes out of 100 MILLION votes since 2000. The study found that mail-in voting was in fact more secure and less subject to interference than in-person voting. As the commission, you are familiar with the mechanical safeguards, but just to review them: The envelopes dropped into a secure box, and monitored by the USPS who has their own law enforcement, the ballots not being counted if they have been tampered with, and the envelope safeguards to ensure that any tampering is clear, the privacy of the vote protected by a security sleeve, and the signature verified and as secure as that of any credit cards. If we are not willing to trust the mail-in ballots than we should not be utilizing credit cards either. Mail-in ballots are as secure as they have ever been, and there is no credible data to support ruling out mail-in ballots on the basis of security fears.

On the other hand, cutting out the option of mail-in ballots to Hawaii residents who for multiple reasons cannot show up in person, critically deprives a significant and election-changing portion of the population of Hawaii of their constitutional right to exercise their vote, and unfairly influences the outcome of any election, tilts it in favor of those with privilege who have more resources and prevents those with needs from being heard. So while no method may be foolproof, including in-person voting, not allowing mail-in ballots when so many need access to it for their right to vote is a constitutional violation, and in itself would represent a different kind of voter fraud, that of unconstitutional vote deprivation.

The Facts

Mail voting is meticulously designed to ensure overlapping safeguards at every stage of the voting process.

- Registration checks. Only verified registered voters receive mail ballots. During the registration process,
 applicant information is verified against a variety of state and federal databases, and an array of federal and
 state requirements ensure that election officials routinely follow up with voters to ensure their information is
 current.
 - Strict mail security protocols. Ballots are sent by non-forwardable mail in clearly marked envelopes, often with specialized security protocols like opaque envelopes, tamper-evident seals, and privacy sleeves. Any ballots that are returned as undeliverable are immediately canceled.
- Ballot tracking. In most jurisdictions, ballots are tracked so that both election officials and voters can follow
 their ballot through the mailstream and ensure it's been delivered and counted as expected.
- Signature verification. Once received by election officials, ballots are not unsealed or removed from envelopes until and unless the information on the ballot envelope is filled out, the signature matches the voter's signature on file, and the envelope is free from signs of tampering. A failure of any one of these points will be resolved by bipartisan teams, who do not count the ballot unless they can get in touch with the voter who can confirm the authenticity of the ballot or submit a new one.

Physical and digital security. Ballots don't just sit around warehouses in unsecured stacks. Like ballots cast
in person, mail ballots are subject to sophisticated and redundant chain-of-custody protocols, physical seals
and barriers, exceedingly controlled access, bipartisan teams, and surveillance.

Bottom Line

Voting by mail is safe and secure. It's a popular choice for states across the political spectrum and is used by voters of all ideological stripes. The history of absentee voting reflects a bipartisan — and often Republican-led — commitment to providing voters with cost-effective, efficient, and user-friendly government solutions. We shouldn't let fiery, fact-free rhetoric lead us backward.

Numerous reports and research studies from the past several years conclude that mail-in voting is a safe and secure method, despite politically-driven disinformation to the contrary

. While isolated cases of fraud have occurred, they are rare and are swiftly addressed by election officials and law enforcement.

Key findings from recent research on mail-in voting security:

Layered security measures: Election systems use multiple, overlapping safeguards to ensure mail ballot integrity. These include signature verification, unique ballot tracking barcodes, and strict chain-of-custody protocols.

Widespread fraud is extremely unlikely: Studies consistently find that mail-in voter fraud is exceptionally rare. A 2020 study from the National Vote at Home Institute found that over 20 years, only 143 criminal convictions for mail-in voter fraud occurred out of 250 million mail ballots cast. Research from the Caltech/MIT Voting Technology Project confirmed in 2020 that fraud is negligible.

Low risk of tampering: Experts consider large-scale tampering with mail ballots almost impossible due to the security features of the ballots and envelopes. Counterfeiting ballots is extremely difficult, and ballots are secured throughout the handling process.

Ballot tracking: Most states now offer ballot tracking tools that allow voters to monitor their ballot's status from mailing to counting. This increases transparency and allows officials to cancel and replace lost or stolen ballots.

Impact on turnout: Research from the Stanford Institute for Economic Policy Research found that vote-by-mail modestly increases overall voter turnout without benefiting a single political party.

Recent security discussions and updates

USPS updates: In 2024, the U.S. Postal Service (USPS) continued its robust program for securely handling election mail, which includes a dedicated law enforcement agency, specialized handling, and working closely with election officials. However, recent USPS system changes have raised concerns about the timing of postmarks, which could affect the timeliness of last-minute ballots in some states.

Drop box security: Research from the <u>Brennan Center for Justice</u> shows that official ballot drop boxes, where available, are a secure and reliable option for returning mail-in ballots. They are provided by government officials and are often monitored by video surveillance.

Ongoing legal challenges: Mail-in voting continues to face legal challenges, such as a 2025 lawsuit in North Carolina targeting military mail-in ballots, which was ultimately rejected by a federal court.

Additional context on mail-in voting

Long history: Absentee voting has been used in the U.S. since the Civil War and is not a new or untested process.

Partisan attacks: According to a 2025 report from the <u>Voting Rights Lab</u>, unfounded political attacks on mail voting have led to restrictive legislation in several states.

Voter errors: While fraud is minimal, a more significant issue identified by researchers is voter error. Ballots may be uncounted due to issues like mismatched signatures or being received after the deadline. Many states have "notice and cure" processes to inform voters of such issues so they can be fixed.

Bottom Line

Voting by mail is safe and secure. It's a popular choice for states across the political spectrum and is used by voters of all ideological stripes. The history of absentee voting reflects a bipartisan — and often Republican-led — commitment to providing voters with cost-effective, efficient, and user-friendly government solutions. We shouldn't let fiery, fact-free rhetoric lead us backward.

We are writing to give comments on why we no longer support mail-in voting.

For all of our voting lives we voted in person, on election day, in our district, where we would show our ID, be verified and sign the voter roll book, and cast our vote in person.

At some point mail-in voting became available, and we have utilized it in most cases.

We never thought there could be any problems with it until the 2020 election, where it seemed there were many problems verifying that the election results were correct around the entire country. We heard stories of people receiving multiple ballots, voter rolls containing deceased people, people that had moved and were not eligible to vote in that district, ballots appearing from under tables to be counted over and over, ballots being transported across state lines, poll watchers being denied viewing access, and on and on. We never got any real verification that the results were true and correct for the elections. We never saw any proof of the results, but rather every effort possible to block proving the results were correct from denials, to obfuscation, to lawsuits, to vicious character attacks and eventually persecutions of anyone who was deemed an "election denier." This left us mistrustful of the entire election process, and certainly did not give us any faith in "democracy."

Although the mail-in ballots are convenient, and allow time to research all the candidates, we now believe that they are potentially rampant for fraud, and the results can no longer be trusted.

We do not believe that voting in person, on election day, with an ID to verify that the person is a legitimate, LEGAL, registered voter, is a "threat to democracy." Rather, it is more of an assurance for everyone that election results are true and correct. Shouldn't that be more of a certification of "democracy?" Shouldn't we be able to know that election results are true,

correct, and verifiable?

While there needs to be a mail-in process for elderly, disabled, military and or persons who are not in the country or able to vote on election day at their polling places, this can be done with absentee ballots and they should be thoroughly vetted as well.

Mail-in ballots should no longer be the norm, since they have reached the point where they can be abused and fraudulent votes can potentially be cast.

Therefore, we no longer support mail-in voting.

We support returning to in-person voting, at our polling places, WITH ID, for LEGAL citizens who have PRE-REGISTERED on election day only. We also support results to be announced that night, and not drag on for days or weeks, while additional votes keep "coming in" to be counted. There should be a deadline for ballots to be received, and if they are not, they should not be counted.

As a longtime resident of Honolulu, I write to express my strong support for continuing Mail-In Elections. Mail-in voting is a safe, reliable, and convenient way for me to exercise my constitutional right to vote. I have used mail-in voting for years since it became available to voters here. Besides relieving me of the need to drive to a polling place, I can take my time to review the candidates and any issues on a ballot before voting as opposed to the very few minutes in a booth allowed in on-site voting. From my years of experience, I have never had cause to worry about the safety and confidentiality of my mail-in ballot or the accuracy of the election results. I have not seen or read of any credible evidence of fraudulent voting in Hawai'i or malfeasance by election officials. Voting by mail doesn't favor one political party over others. The online ballot tracking system works very well and I have used it in every election to be sure that my ballot was received and counted.

Aloha,

I am IN SUPPORT of mail-in-voting. Since mail-in-voting has occurred in Hawaii, I have had the opportunity to really research those on the ballot and make an informed decision before casting my vote. I was able to take as much time as I needed in my own home and also discuss with family members.

I did not need to take time off of work to vote; I was able to simply drive down to the District Park and put it in the voting box. VERY CONVENIENT.

Besides my own personal support, here are other reasons why keeping mail-in-voting makes sense:

Greater voter participation: Since transitioning to vote-by-mail, Hawaii has experienced higher voter turnout. For example, a 2023 study found that Hawaii saw a 14% increase in turnout of registered voters between the 2016 and 2020 presidential elections. https://journals.sagepub.com/doi/full/10.1177/20531680221089197

Enough ballots: In 2012, 51 polling places in Hawaii ran out of paper ballots. The Hawaii Elections Commission was told that the elections office had used the wrong formula to determine how many ballots would be needed. Additionally, some voters were given the wrong ballots.

Non-Partisan Favor: There is no evidence to suggest that voting by mail favors one party over another. The Stanford study found that the increase in voting changed the amount of voting but not the composition of eligible voters. It didn't favor any racial, age, or economic groups. https://drive.google.com/file/d/1f0cxGEvuqJ-aYl0nRQyq62Glo6bWquXC/view

Ballot tracking: Hawaii voters can sign up for notifications to track their ballot, receiving alerts when it has been mailed, received, and accepted for counting. This increases transparency and provides peace of mind.

Multiple return options: Voted ballots can be returned by mail or dropped off at designated "places of deposit" located across the islands, providing flexible options for voters.

Reduces the cost of recruiting and training poll workers: This allows local election officials and county election officials to focus on other problems.

Fraud is extremely rare: Hawaii's election officials maintain that robust security protocols are in place to ensure the integrity of the vote. These protocols include a "cure process" that allows voters to fix signature mismatches, which further secures the validation process.

Paper trail for security: All mail-in voting uses hand-marked paper ballots, which are considered the "gold standard" for election security. This provides a paper trail for potential recounts or audits, including risk-limiting audits.

Workload management: The all-mail system allows election officials to process and scrutinize ballots over a longer period, reducing the administrative burden on Election Day and enabling them to catch potential issues early.

Faster results (in some cases): While not guaranteed, the ability to pre-process ballots ahead of Election Day can expedite the release of results. This helps combat

misinformation that can arise from slow ballot counting.

Having all this experience with voting, and also having actively participated in the elections process, I am a firm believer that VOTE BY MAIL in Hawai'i is absolutely the way to go for a number of reasons. Mail-In voting provides these benefits to us voters and to the State of Hawaii

- Removes significant barriers to voting in the polling stations such as having to work during the voting hours or not being able to drive to the polling stations.
- Gives voters the opportunity to make more informed decisions on ballot issues. It permits me time to research both issues and candidates prior to filling in my ballot.
- Permits voters to safely vote in the privacy of their own home. Recently there have been reports on the mainland of ICE agents stationing themselves outside of polling stations. This is intimidating for some voters to the point that they turn around and don't vote. Though I don't think we've seen that yet, ICE has been active in picking up people in our islands. Who knows what they would do at our polling stations if everyone had to do walk-in voting. I believe the majority of us here are hapa so I guess we're all suspicious in the eyes of ICE personnel.
- Permits family members to help their kupuna with the voting process. For example, reminding them to sign their completed ballot at the appropriate spot,.
- Gives voters convenient, secure choices for turning in their completed ballots mail back, drop in an official secure drop box or walk into one of the walk-in vote locations.

I'm appalled that election commissioners would possibly be advocating to rescind Hawai'i's VOTE BY MAIL law and intend to convey my support for this process to my own State Legislators.

There are ways to improve on VOTE BY MAIL such as adding more secure drop boxes and also adding more walk-in locations (perhaps allowing more rural/remote sites to be provided for shorter windows of time).

But let each of us look within our own hearts and our own communities, and let each of us put our shoulder to the wheel to root out injustice wherever it exists.

It is We The People who must make good the promise of America.

For at the real heart of battle for equality is a deep-seated belief in the democratic process. Equality depends not on the force of arms or tear gas, but upon the force of moral right; not on recourse to violence, but on respect for law and order.

In Selma, as everywhere, we seek and pray for peace. We seek order. We seek unity. But we will not accept the peace of stifled rights, or the order imposed by fear, or the unity that stifles protest. For peace cannot be purchased at the cost of liberty."

I ask you, Members of the Election Commission, to utilize this opportunity for you to look within your own hearts, within our own community, and put your shoulders to the wheel to root out injustice as it presents itself here: in the unconstitutional attempt to limit access to the democratic institution via mail-in voting. Our mission, as We The People, is to right wrong, to do justice, and to serve our fellow man. Please honor these tenets as guardians of "liberty and justice for all."

I live in the Mānoa-Makiki and understand the Commission is considering advancing initiatives to the state legislature to restrict mail-in balloting by requiring mail receipts. Let me register my strong opposition and briefly share why mail-in balloting is important to the integrity of Hawai'i elections and should not only be maintained but strengthened.

My support for mail-in balloting is rooted in both practical considerations and in principle:

Practical: as a busy working professional, I had to find time to participate in the democratic process by finding a polling station, driving there, and waiting in line to cast my vote. While the commission did a reasonably good job of establishing a polling place near me and staffing it to reduce the wait time, this still created a barrier to voting that mail-in balloting completely eliminated. I was fortunate to have the flexibility in my work schedule to vote; I was fortunate to have transportation to the polling station. Others are not as fortunate, and we should not create unnecessary restrictions to having citizens' voice heard. Additionally, equipping and staffing all those polling locations requires resources that mail-in balloting helps lessen. An initiative that makes it easier for citizens to cast their votes and reduces resource requirements would seem to be a no-brainer.

Principle: In a country founded on the principle of government of the people, by the people, and for the people, any effort to restrict citizens' electoral participation is undemocratic and un-American. It would seem to be the Election Commission's purpose to make participation in the democratic process as easy as possible while maintaining the integrity of that process. It makes one wonder why anyone would seek to make it <u>harder</u> for citizens to vote. Lacking any evidence impugning the integrity of mail-in balloting, we must assume that such efforts represent an attempt at voter suppression.

I appreciate the opportunity to address the commission this morning and offer these words as documentation of what I tried convey verbally.

Bottom line: the Commission should do nothing that restricts citizens' ability to participate in the democratic process via mail-in balloting. Please feel free to contact me if you would like further input.

Aloha Chair Curtis,

I am writing to formally express concern regarding your recent action to remove Commissioner Ralph Cushnie from an official meeting of the Office of Elections Commission. Your stated justification, that this action was permitted under the Hawai'i Sunshine Law, is factually and legally incorrect.

The Sunshine Law, codified as HRS Chapter 92, governs public access to meetings, notice, minutes, and transparency. It does not contain any provision authorizing a commissioner or chair to remove another member from a public meeting. Specifically, HRS 92-2, which defines terms such as "board," "meeting," and "deliberation," provides no disciplinary or removal authority whatsoever. The Sunshine Law exists to ensure that public meetings are conducted openly ... not to provide a mechanism for silencing or excluding members.

By invoking Chapter 92 as justification, your action misrepresented the law and violated the very principles of transparency it was intended to protect.

Furthermore, the Commission conducts its meetings in accordance with **Robert's Rules of Order**, which strictly outline how order is to be maintained. Under those rules:

- Only the **presiding officer** may call a member to order for disorderly conduct, and
- No member may be removed or silenced without due process which includes a clear finding of disorderly behavior and, if necessary, a motion, a second, and a majority vote of the body.

Your unilateral action to remove Commissioner Cushnie, absent such procedure, constitutes a **violation of Robert's Rules of Order** and a denial of due process within the meeting.

This action undermines both the integrity of the Commission and the public's trust in its fairness. Commissioner Cushnie was duly appointed under **HRS 11-7**, to represent the citizens of Hawaii. No provision of the Sunshine Law or Robert's Rules confers that power upon the Chair or any other member during a meeting.

Accordingly, I respectfully request that the Commission:

- 1. **Acknowledge on the record** that the Sunshine Law does not provide authority for a commissioner's removal from a meeting;
- 2. **Correct the meeting minutes** to accurately reflect that the Chair's action was procedurally improper and contested; and
- 3. **Ensure compliance** with both HRS Chapter 92 and Robert's Rules of Order in all future meetings, protecting the lawful participation of all commissioners and the public.

Transparency, fairness, and adherence to the law are the foundation of public confidence in this Commission. I urge you to correct this matter promptly and reaffirm the Commission's commitment to lawful and respectful conduct in all proceedings. If you want trust, build trust. Be part of the solution, not perpetuate a problem.

I can use my parents as an example. My father was 80 and my mother 78 years old when they had to move into an assisted living facility, and both of them were no longer able to drive. There are many, many other residents in assisted living facilities and care homes throughout the state who are in the same situation.

This is especially true since the average age of our residents keeps going higher every year. And, as the population ages, they become more infirm making voting in person more difficult.

Aloha Election Commission Staff,

Please share with the Commission this testimony I gave verbally today.

On October 1, 2025, five of nine Election Commission members voted in favor to write to the legislature and advise the Chief Election Officer to make 7 named changes to current election procedures. These 7 changes are:

- * Return to in-person voting in the precinct
- * Hand count paper ballots
- * One day voting
- * Require ID
- * Make exception to the above for military and special needs [implied: only these]
- * Count votes where cast [that would be in each precinct, as seen above]
- * Report the vote count before sending ballots to the county

Essentially this request is for a system that restricts voter access. These changes would alter current procedure to provide:

- One day only for voting, and only in person. No early voting days.
- Mailed ballots only if by exceptional request, only from a military voter or a special needs voter
- Every precinct statewide would need to staff and train its Elections Office volunteers not just in voting day procedures but also in ballot counting

Note: the current mail-in procedure does already use predominantly paper ballots. That is relevant to the second item in the Commission's motion to write to the legislature. (Currently, exceptions allow assistive technology to be used as requested. Voters with special needs may request an accessible electronic ballot)

Our present mail-in system works. The effort by a bare majority of Commissioners on October 1st to dump the mail-in balloting and revert to voting in-person on one day only, is a "solution" in search of a "problem."

I am calling this out as it restricts citizens' access to voting. It especially restricts voting access by working people, elderly, low income voters, and houseless citizens.

I urge the Commission to rescind this request to radically change the mail-in system.
