Aloha Chair and Members of the Commission:

As a Kaua'I member of the Official election volunteers on Kaua'i, and as a member of the Democratic Party of Hawaii including membership at the Democrat's SCC and the Women's Caucus as well as a member of the RULES and PLATFORM committee at the SCC, I am definitely advocating to support voting by mail.

Analysis of the Hawaii Office of Elections Letter (OE-25-131)

The letter from the Hawaii Office of Elections reframes the issue(s) found in my HAVA complaint, and depends on data that the Office has not actually provided. Your 'ten-ballot' comparison combines all voting methods and avoids the mail-envelope chain of custody that is the core issue. Unless you produce the Statewide Voter Registration System daily accepted and rejected counts (by channel) with reason-code details, the county-to-state batch-linked manifests, and the electronic ballot duplication counts, the nineteen-thousand-forty-two envelope-to-ballot gap in Hawai'i County remains unresolved; along with the other issues and concerns. Below I provide a plain-language explanation comparing what the Office (Respondents) claims with the evidence in my files and my Help America Vote Act complaint. "You" here means all Respondents.

What the Office of Elections claims and why it is wrong

"There is only a difference of 10"

The Office claims that 83,696 "voters who cast a ballot" are recorded in the Statewide Voter Registration System and that 83,686 "ballots were counted," creating a difference of only ten. This mixes all types of voting together and avoids your specific question: mail-ballot chain of custody. The County of Hawaii's own records show 76,595 mail ballots counted but only 57,553 return envelopes documented across all mail channels in Hawai'i County - a gap of 19,042. The "ten-ballot" number does not answer the envelope-to-ballot reconciliation I, and others, raised.

"The Statewide Voter Registration System is the official record - trust it"

Scott Nago's letter says the Statewide Voter Registration System is the authoritative record of who voted and suggests the postal and drop-box logs are incomplete. However, the Office has still not produced the daily accepted and rejected counts by channel or the reason-code tallies I, and others, requested, so its conclusion cannot be verified. My Help America Vote Act complaint documents that denial and the circular referral between the State and the County over who holds the data.

"Your postal receipts are incomplete; field counts are subjective"

Even if the postal paperwork were imperfect, that is why the reconciliation should depend on the Statewide Voter Registration System → transfer manifests → ballots counted sequence. No Respondent has supplied the county-to-state transfer manifests for Hawai'i County and previously admitted that transfer forms were missing in Maui County. That weakens Respondents' (Nago's letter as of now) dismissal of my documentation while you all continue to withhold the ledgers that could settle the issue.

"You ignored electronic ballots from military and overseas voters that were duplicated onto paper"

If military, overseas, or accessible electronic ballots were duplicated onto paper, each and every Respondent should provide the number for each day and show how those ballots are recorded in the Statewide Voter Registration System and then transferred to the counting center. The letter mentions these ballots but does not give counts or connect them to manifests.

Nonsensical points in Nago's argument

- 1. You changed the basis of comparison.
 - You responded to a different question (total voters versus total ballots) instead of my evidence about mail-envelope reconciliation. County of Hawaii records, for one example, show 57,553 envelopes (27,912 from places of deposit and voter service centers plus 29,641 from postal receipts), while State results show 76,595 mail ballots counted a 19,042 difference.
- 2. You rely on the Statewide Voter Registration System but will not show the data. You claim it is accurate but have not produced the daily accepted and rejected counts for October through November 2024 (with reason codes and batch identifications) that would allow verification. My complaint on the other hand documents that the State issued Notice 1360 denying those counts and directing requesters to the counties, while the counties point back to the State as administrator.
- 3. You dismiss field counts but refuse to release the primary chain-of-custody records. The normal method to verify the Statewide Voter Registration System is to tie each batch in that system to a physical handoff using county-to-state manifests that list containers, tray and seal numbers, counts, and signatures. These records remain unproduced for Hawaii County, and the State already admitted missing forms in Maui. No Respondent still is absolved from missing election envelopes along with other irregularities.
- 4. Your earlier Over-Under letter contradicts your current claim.

 The State's March 17, 2025 Over-Under table shows Adjusted Mail 76,587 versus Mail Precinct 76,595 (difference of eight) and states that "invalid-condition adjustments" occur during opening. Those adjustments can only reduce ballot totals, not increase them, so they cannot explain a nineteen-thousand increase over documented envelopes.

Where my position remains correct

- I and others correctly define this as a mail-envelope reconciliation problem, not a total-voter problem.
- The Office/Respondents must provide daily accepted and rejected counts by channel, reason-code summaries, and the county-to-state manifests to reconcile 57,553 envelopes with 76,595 mail ballots counted.
- Until you do, your "ten-ballot" claim does not address the nineteen-thousand-forty-twoenvelope gap. The same for all Respondents involved in this particular issue; but also for

all other issues such as not keeping election records (or destroying them) for a federal election

What the Office/Respondents would need to produce to disprove my claim

For Hawaii County (October 1 – November 30 2024), as the main example:

- 1. Daily accepted and rejected counts from the Statewide Voter Registration System with reason-code categories, separated by channel (postal business reply mail, place of deposit, voter service center, electronic or overseas ballots), and including batch identifiers and cumulative totals.
- 2. County-to-state transfer manifests linking each batch identifier to physical containers, trays, or sealed transport units with counts and signatures.
- 3. Daily counts of electronic and overseas ballot returns and the corresponding duplication logs showing how many were transferred onto paper ballots and how those appear in the Statewide Voter Registration System and the manifests.
- 4. Daily opening and verification tallies of invalid conditions (empty envelopes, wrong ballots, signature mismatches, duplicates) to show any legitimate reductions.

If those records bridge the 57,553 documented envelopes to 76,595 counted mail ballots with credible data, - and all the other irregularities - the nineteen-thousand-forty-two theory probably fails. If you do not, my Title III Help America Vote Act claim is confirmed. Know that we now have whistleblowers, plural. This reply is not meant to be all encompassing.

COMPLAINANT'S NOTICE AND REQUEST FOR SCHEDULING ORDER AND HEARING ON THE RECORD

Complainant Election Watch, Inc. respectfully requests that the Commission issue a Scheduling Order and set a hearing on the record in this proceeding pursuant to Section 402 of the Help America Vote Act of 2002 (52 U.S.C. § 21112). Federal law mandates that each State must issue a final determination within ninety (90) days of the filing of a HAVA complaint, unless the complainant consents in writing to a longer period. If the State does not issue a final determination by Day 90, the complaint must then be resolved within sixty (60) additional days under the State's alternative dispute-resolution procedure. See 52 U.S.C. § 21112(a)(2)(A) and (I).

Event Statutory Day Calendar Date

- -Complaint filed Day 0 September 29, 2025
- -Recommended hearing deadline Day 60 November 28, 2025
- -Final determination due Day 90 December 28, 2025
- -ADR process (if no decision by Day 90) must conclude by Day 150 February 26, 2026

Complainants do not consent to extending the ninety-day period. Further noting they object to the ADR imposed by the State HAVA plan, where it conflicts with HAVA's timeline(s). However, any attempt to postpone or relabel the statutory ninety-day deadline by invoking "alternative dispute resolution" before Day 90 would contravene the plain text of 52 U.S.C. § 21112(a)(2).

If no written determination is issued by Day 90, the State/Respondents will automatically be out of compliance and the sixty-day ADR window will begin by operation of federal law.

PROPOSED SCHEDULING ORDER

1. Respondents' Written Response: Respondents shall file and serve a consolidated written response to the complaint within fifteen (15) calendar days from the date of this Order.

- 2. Rolling Production of Core Records: Within ten (10) business days of this Order, and continuing on a rolling basis, Respondents shall produce the following non-confidential, audit-enabling records for the November 5, 2024 General Election (Hawai'i County, all Counties):
- a. Statewide Voter Registration System (SVRS) daily records showing ballots accepted and rejected between October 1 and November 30, 2024, including reason-code tallies and SVRS batch identifiers;
- b. Counties-to-State transfer or chain-of-custody manifests linking each SVRS batch identifier to a physical hand-off, with date, time, origin, destination, container, tray or seal numbers, counts, and initials of releasing and receiving personnel;
- c. United States Postal Service Business Reply Mail (PostalOne!) daily piece counts and monthly statements for all election accounts used by Hawai'i County, and to include all counties, during October–November 2024;
- d. Place-of-Deposit and Voter Service Center intake logs for each location, with pickup times, seal numbers, and daily totals;
- e. Opening and verification tallies of ballots invalidated for conditions such as empty envelopes, wrong election, wrong ballot, mismatched signatures, or multiple ballots.

3. Hearing on the Record

- a. The Commission shall convene a hearing on the record no later than November 28, 2025 (Day 60), leaving sufficient time for a reasoned written decision by December 28, 2025 (Day 90).
- b. The hearing may be conducted in person or in a hybrid format and shall permit testimony from Respondents' custodians of record and from Complainants' witnesses.
- 4. Pre-Hearing Disclosures: No later than seven (7) calendar days before the hearing, each party shall exchange witness lists and exhibit lists, and lodge with the Commission a complete set of exhibits (electronic portable-document format permitted).
- 5. No Waiver of Federal Deadlines: Absent a written consent signed by Complainants, the ninety-day statutory deadline remains fixed. If no final determination issues by Day 90, Complainants will invoke the mandatory sixty-day alternative dispute-resolution process required by 52 U.S.C. § 21112(a)(2)(I). Any "ADR" commenced before Day 90 will be deemed non-compliant with the statute.

ARGUMENT

Section 402 of the Help America Vote Act was enacted to guarantee timely,

transparent, and uniform resolution of election-administration complaints. Its ninety-day deadline is a hard federal requirement, not a goal or guideline. The sixty-day ADR period is a separate fallback procedure triggered only by a State's/Respondents' failure to act within ninety days. Together they create an absolute outer limit of one hundred fifty (150) days unless the complainants consents otherwise.

The proposed schedule conforms to those statutory limits and ensures a meaningful record by requiring early, rolling production of the key reconciliation data that the State itself identifies as foundational:

- -daily SVRS acceptance and rejection data,
- -batch-linked transfer manifests,
- -PostalOne! records, intake logs,
- -and invalid-condition tallies.

Without those materials, the Commission cannot make a lawful finding on the complaint. Noticing again to all Respondents to preserve all evidence.

Office of Elections (OE)

Posted on its website, the OE mission statement is: "To provide secure, accessible, and convenient election services to all citizens statewide." This statement is accompanied by a flashing image of a comfortable chair and pillow captioned: "Cast your vote in comfort. Your ballot comes to you." Accessibility, comfort, and convenience are the mission of the 7-Eleven store. The OE doesn't seem to realize that it exists for a higher purpose.

Election integrity and freedom of speech are essential to creating peace and avoiding tyranny. This is serious business! We need to help the OE recognize its real mission: "To conduct fair, honest, accurate, and secure (*Pono*) elections for the citizens of Hawaii."

A recent elections commission meeting passed a motion requesting an independent review of the 2024 election. While even a superb Governor has only 8 years, the current Chief Elections Officer has been in office for over a decade. The time for new leadership in the Office of Elections has arrived.

Elections Commission (EC)

Extensive recent public testimony before the EC has focused on possible election corruption, and sometimes on distrust of the commissioners appointed by elected political leaders in our legislature. The public often has very little information about those serving on the EC. Perhaps members should post personal statements on the EC website to provide information and to buffer that distrust. For example, the EC includes a lawyer who has sworn to tell the truth and to uphold the law. He has passed the ethics exam (MPRE), and should he lose his license, he would also lose his livelihood. As a medical doctor, I am also familiar with rigorous ethical standards.

It has become customary in medical meetings to disclose conflicts of interest, most often financial, before speaking or presenting data. Such disclosure would be a useful standard for the Office of Elections.

In meetings I conducted as Student Body President of my medical school, I always regarded the Agenda as a helpful guide to focus discussion, never as a weapon to silence free speech from a colleague.

My name is Ruth Robison and I live in Hilo. Thank you for the opportunity to testify on agenda item IV. Updates relating to motions from Permitted Interaction Groups

a) Status of the audit of the Office of Elections

I am in strong opposition to the Commission's motion to request a return to polling place elections. I have been a member of the League of Women Voters for 15 years. I am not speaking for the League, but as a member, in concert with it. "The League strongly supports voting by mail and will oppose partisan undermining of elections."

When the COVID pandemic struck Hawaii in 2020, the Elections Office was prepared because the state legislature had passed voting by mail. The League had worked for many years to support this effort. Why? Because the League's mission is "Empowering Voters. Defending Democracy." This mission translates into several actions, including working to maintain, and increase where needed, citizens' access to voting. Voting by mail does this.

Some people argue, with consistent evidence to the contrary, that voting by mail increases voter fraud. However, the truth is that voter fraud is virtually non-existent in the US. The New York Times editorial board has stated, "states that use vote-by-mail have encountered essentially zero fraud: Oregon, the pioneer in this area, has sent out more than 100 million mail-in ballots since 2000, and has documented only about a dozen cases of proven fraud." That's 0.00001 percent of all votes cast. It is more likely for an American to be struck by lightning than to commit mail voting fraud.

If there are concerns that an eligible voter's mail ballots could be lost or uncounted, in-person polling sites still exist to provide a mechanism to correct problems, provide essential services, and ensure that every eligible voter can cast a valid ballot.

I have worked at the Hawaii County Elections Office counting center during elections, opening ballot envelopes and as an official observer. I urge anyone who has doubts about the security of the voting system in Hawaii to do the same. One cannot help but be struck by the careful, redundant procedures that are in place to ensure that every vote is counted correctly. The Elections Office staff are

professionals who care deeply about safeguarding our elections.

Do not take voting by mail away from the citizens of Hawaii. We want to have more eligible voters exercise their right to vote, not fewer.

Dear Chair Curtis and Members of the EAC:

I am writing to oppose the motion before you "to return to in person voting in the precinct, hand counting paper ballots..."

I oppose any move to rescind or restrict Hawaii's use of voting by mail. The Office of Elections spent years studying the merits of voting by mail before they adopted the system in Hawaii. Implementing a vote by mail system came about partly because so many voters had switched to absentee voting that the State was running two parallel voting systems (in person and by absentee mail) prior to adopting all mail voting. Essentially, Hawaii voters chose to vote by mail when so many used absentee ballots. Please do not force voters and the OE to return to antiquated procedures as the present system is working well. I say that the system is working well from the perspective of one who has volunteered as an "official observer" at elections in Hawaii County since the 1980's so I have had some experience in monitoring the process. I have repeatedly been impressed with the procedures and audits done by the OE to assure that our election results accurately reflect the votes cast.

As one who has participated in hundreds of hand-counted elections for community associations, clubs, and unions over the years, hand counting is extremely slow and much more likely to initial inaccuracies than electronically counted ballots. Election results on a statewide basis would likely take weeks, rather than hours or days to be determined. This would be unlikely to increase voter's confidence in our elections.

Dear Mr. Nago,

On behalf of concerned citizens and election integrity advocates, I am writing to express strong support for the Elections Commission's October 1, 2025 motion, as documented in your correspondence OE-25-121 dated October 6, 2025, recommending that the Legislature direct the Chief Election Officer to return to in-person, precinct-based voting.

The Commission's motion specifically called for:

"In-person voting in the precinct, hand counting paper ballots, one-day voting, ID required, with the exceptions for absentee voting for military and special needs. Votes shall be counted where cast, then reported to the county before transferring ballots."

This motion reflects a growing concern among voters about transparency, accountability, and confidence in Hawaii's electoral process. Returning to traditional polling place elections, with local precinct-level oversight, ensures that ballots are properly handled, counted, and reported where they are cast. Such measures enhance the chain of custody, minimize opportunities for irregularities, and reinforce public confidence in our democratic process.

Need for Federal Oversight and DOJ Election Monitors

In addition to restoring precinct-based voting, I urge the Office of Elections and the State Legislature to formally request that the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) deploy election monitors to Hawaii polling sites during the next statewide election.

Since the 2020 elections, numerous reports and citizen complaints have surfaced regarding potential irregularities in mail-in voting procedures, ballot handling, and delays in vote reporting. These concerns—though sometimes localized—have eroded trust among voters. The deployment of DOJ

election monitors would provide an additional layer of impartial oversight and help ensure that Hawaii's elections are conducted in compliance with federal and state election laws.

This request is consistent with recent actions by the DOJ's Civil Rights Division. For example, the Department recently announced the deployment of federal election monitors to polling places in California and New Jersey following requests from state political organizations citing similar integrity concerns. Hawaii's voters deserve the same level of oversight and assurance that their elections are free from irregularities or procedural inconsistencies.

Rationale for Returning to In-Person, Paper-Ballot Voting

Transparency and Accountability – Hand counting paper ballots in public view restores community trust and provides a verifiable audit trail.

Chain of Custody – Counting ballots at the precinct before transfer to the county eliminates opportunities for error or tampering.

Voter Identification – Ensuring each voter presents valid identification upholds election security and fairness.

Equity and Accessibility – Maintaining absentee voting for military personnel and individuals with special needs continues to provide access for those unable to vote in person.

Conclusion

The integrity of Hawaii's elections is vital to maintaining public confidence in our democracy. The Office of Elections and Legislature should take decisive action to implement the Commission's recommendations and formally request DOJ oversight for upcoming elections.

By returning to precinct-based, in-person voting with transparent counting procedures and federal monitoring support, Hawaii can serve as a model for election integrity, fairness, and accountability.

Thank you for your attention to this matter and for your continued commitment to ensuring fair and transparent elections for the people of Hawaii.

I am deeply saddened by the unfounded attacks on this system, which appear to mirror the politically motivated narratives we've seen at the federal level.

I am a resident of Waialae-Kahala, Honolulu, Hawaii and I strongly support the vote-by-mail process. I have an 88-year-old mother whose only way to vote is by mail-in ballot. Mail-in ballots are an important way to include everyone in the voting process who are house-bound, live remotely, or are out-of-state during an election.

Here are five reasons why anyone can vote by mail with confidence.

1. Voting by mail isn't new.

Absentee voting dates to the Civil War, when several states granted members of the military the opportunity to vote when they were "absent" from their home districts. Now, every state has some type of vote-by-mail process. In five states—Oregon, Washington, Hawaii, Utah, and Colorado—mail balloting is the primary method of voting. In 2018, a quarter of the electorate voted by mail.

2. It's difficult to request a mail-in ballot or cast a vote by mail using someone else's name.

It's a misconception that because there's no way of knowing who's requesting or voting a ballot, it would be easy to apply for or vote a ballot by mail in someone else's name. Every step of the vote-by-mail process includes security procedures to ensure the voter requesting the ballot is the voter receiving and voting the ballot.

The most common way to verify that mail ballots are coming from the intended voter is through signature verification. Voters must sign an affidavit on the ballot envelope. When the ballot is returned to the election office, election officials examine and verify every signature, comparing it with voter registration records or other documents that contain the voter's signature.

Some states require copies of identification documents or that their

envelopes are signed before witnesses or are notarized.

3. Nationwide security procedures protect the delivery of mail-in ballots. Mailed ballots typically are delivered to and picked up from the post office by two election office staff and transported in a secure container. These ballots are also processed by teams of trained election staff to ensure the integrity of the counting process.

4. Vote-by-mail programs do not favor one political party over another. Researchers have conducted many studies to determine whether a partisan bias results from election reforms designed to make it easier to vote, of which vote-by-mail is one. A recent study by the Stanford Institute for Economic Policy Research found that "(1) vote-by-mail does not appear to affect either party's share of turnout; (2) vote-by-mail does not appear to increase either party's vote share; and (3) vote-by-mail modestly increases overall average turnout rates, in line with previous estimates."

The researchers say their findings essentially dispel concerns that mail-in voting would cause a major electoral shift toward one party.

5. Voter impersonation and ballot falsification are exceedingly rare. Based on a meticulous review of elections that were investigated for voter fraud, the Brennan Center for Justice found minuscule incident rates of ineligible individuals casting ballots at the polls – no more than 0.0025 percent. Numerous reports have confirmed this finding that voter impersonation is exceedingly rare. Research shows that voter fraud is similarly rare with mail ballots.

Chair Curtis and Commissioners:

Regarding item IV a) of today's agenda, in your October 6 letter to the Legislature you did not provide any explanation of your outlandish request to

"advise the Chief Election Officer to return to in person voting in the precinct, hand counting paper ballots, one day voting, ID required, with the exceptions for absentee voting for military and special needs."

Standing by itself, this motion seeks to bypass the normal approach to lawmaking. It was a hasty, ill-conceived idea that took place after more than three and a half hours of your seven-hour October 1 meeting.

The motion is serious, completely unacceptable to the League of Women Voters, and unlikely to succeed. It reflects nothing more than the opinion of certain members of your Commission.

You already know that Hawaii voters like mail voting. Some form of voting by mail has been available here for more than twenty years. Though voters have an opportunity to vote in person if they wish, only 5% of them used this option in the 2024 General Election. *Why would you want to suppress voting by the remaining 483,000 people who voted by mail?*

Regarding hand counting, you already know that hand counting 400-500 thousand plus ballots accurately and efficiently is impossible, without the use of the best available scanner and software technology pre-approved by the Federal Elections Assistance Commission.

Do you think it is important for voters and candidates to have accurate and timely announcements of election outcomes? This would also be impossible without machine scanning and software tabulation of our large volume of paper election ballots.

The League of Women Voters supports the legitimate oversight of our elections by the State's Elections Commission. Oversight should only be exercised by entities with legitimate authority, like your Permitted Interaction Groups (PIG's) and a possible forthcoming audit of the 2024 elections by the State Auditor.

We must have oversight that is data-driven and includes recommendations for corrective action that correspond with the issue at hand.

Regarding Item IV b) of today's agenda,

This motion requests that the Hawaii County Elections Division "obtain and provide the complete set of USPS business reply mail receipts accounting for all mail ballots received from the Hawaii County postal service during the 2024 General Election."

Beginning with your Kauai Permitted Interaction Group report of August 27, 2025, you mischaracterized postal service records of ballot envelopes; to allegedly show it was impossible to "independently" validate the official ballot count using these postal service records. The Office of Elections refuted this charge in their August 22, 2025, report, which describes the statewide process for reconciling ballot counts between the State and counties. This report is available to the public: https://elections.hawaii.gov/wp-content/uploads/OE-25-114.pdf

The USPS receipts are merely provided to election officials for billing purposes and cannot be relied upon as audit documents. The League calls on you to accept that the Statewide Voter Registration System and its associated reports provide the official record of ballot envelopes received and counted.

We think it would be ill-advised for our Legislature to rescind Act 136 that enacted voting by mail uniformly across all counties for all elections commencing in 2020. Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony.

Written Testimony in Strong Support of Mail-In Voting

Aloha Chair Curtis and elections commissioners.

My name is James Raymond. I am a retired Deputy Attorney General, but testify purely as an individual citizen and resident of Kailua. I'm submitting this testimony in support of mail-in voting.

I retired earlier than planned due to mobility issues that made it increasingly difficult to navigate downtown courthouses. This would also make it difficult to vote in person.

But today, I want to discuss pretexts. Pretexts are designed to hide a bad motive underneath a good one. Pretexts allow attorneys to advance what appear on the surface to be reasonable arguments in the hope of persuading a judge or jury. But the pretext is really just cover for bad intentions.

Gov't attorneys are well acquainted with pretextual arguments because while they don't have to advance them, they frequently have to defend against them.

This is true because our laws, often described as blunt instruments, are so often used in unintended ways to justify all manner of bad actions -- and pretexts are well-suited to covering over bad motives under the guise of good intentions.

Fact finders: judges, juries, even commissions for example, that are confronted with pretexts, may be persuaded by the fact that a well-crafted pretext sounds reasonable. Some fact finders may even know that the pretext is hiding a bad motive, but they are on board with the goals of those advancing the pretext and are happy to use the cover they provide.

I, and most of Hawai'i, know that while not perfect, our current system provides free and fair elections and maximizes a citizen's opportunity to exercise the franchise.

I, and most of Hawai'i (indeed most of America) know the attempts to restrict or eliminate mail-in ballots are advanced under pretextual arguments claiming they are addressing election fraud and integrity when the real motive is to advance the maga agenda to disproportionately disenfranchise Democratic voters.

I'll conclude with some questions: Which category of fact finder are you commissioners? Do you recognize and reject the pretext? Or, do you unwittingly accept the pretext? Or are you actively working to advance the maga agenda knowing the pretext is false?

And finally, are you comfortable knowing your grandchildren will learn what you did to either save or subvert our democracy?





In Support of Investigating Incorrect Ballot-Counting and Assuring Accurate Voting by Mail

I applaud the Commission's determination to identify causes and solutions to erroneous ballot counting reported from the previous election. The Commission has provided reliable, accurate, and popular voting by mail over the years, and any discrepancies should be eliminated.

I worked several election cycles as a Precinct President and VAO, and am fully aware of the challenges of in-person voting. We always had double-checking to insure accuracy in our election counts. At that time I always voted "absentee", as I was monitoring a voting site other than my own.

In the ensuing decades, I have found voting by mail to be convenient and reliable, and find that it is also a hit nationwide, with repeatedly proven reliability and accuracy. False claims of election fraud have been routinely and repeatedly defeated by the facts. Ballot counting has proven to be improved through voting by mail.

I have also served on union elections, which are closely monitored, and I testify to their sophistication and accuracy. We always have observers, including cranks looking for excuses to overturn results they don't like, and they typically struggle to make a case, even though they can see everything out in the open with their own eyes. The processing centers likewise are advanced, closely monitored, and transparent.

In today's world, many voters are required to be working throughout elections, and of course many are sick or injured. For all of them, voting by mail is the obvious, reliable, and accurate solution. If certain voting stations are inadequately supported in this effort, your investigation should prove thorough and remedial. Voting by mail also provides more time to assure correct and intentional choices among the candidates, and especially when other ballot measures are considered. It also allows for better focus by double-checking, ballot-curing, and less-pressured observation at every stage. It has proven popular, reliable, and instrumental for today's higher levels of political conflict.

In general, mail-in balloting is a great success, with very minor disceprancies ever detected in follow-up non-partisan investigations. It has only recently, during the Trump insurrection era, been turned into a fable for bad-faith sour grapes and cheating partisans of unpopular measures. I am writing this email testimony in support of my view that mail in ballot voting in Hawaii should not be eliminated. There are a great many reasons for continuing to support vote by mail. The major reason is that a greater turnout can be expected because of the convenience and accessibility of voting by mail. One study found that Hawaii saw a 14 percent increase in turnout in 2020 compared to 2016, the first election conducted entirely by mail.

Also, since the ballots are mailed ahead of time, Hawaii voters have ample time to research and become well informed about voting issues. Further, there are multiple options for returning a mail in ballot in Hawaii. A voter can use the mail, use a drop box, or dop off the ballot at a voter service center. Again, the flexibility of mail ballot voting only leads to a more robust voting turnout. With mail-in voting, voters who lack access to transportation, the elderly, those traveling out of state, or at college, or working night jobs or long hours can all participate in the voting process.

Further, the mail in ballot is a physical piece of evidence which creates a paper trail for any postelection audits. Hawaii mail in ballots require a signature which can then be verified with the signature on file with the voter registration agencies. This built in verification process minimizes the prospect of mail fraud. Many experts on election results agree that voter fraud is rare, and the risk of widespread faud is minimial, even with all mail elections. See the Heritage Foundation's review of Oregon mail elections which found 14 cases of attempted fraud out of 15.5 Million ballots cast. See e.g., opinions of Univ of Chicago Prof.Anthony Fowler, and others.

In addition, many studies have shown that states have saved considerable sums of money by using mail in ballots. For example, the state of Colorado saved 40 percent of its election costs after resorting to all mail in voting. Although there isn't any current data yet on whether Hawaii has had any election cost savings since going to all mail voting, it is likely that in the long term, evidence will show overall cost savings to the state.

Aloha chair and Elections Commission members. I am James Gashel. My email address is <jgashel0923@gmail.com> I'm testifying today as an individual citizen of our state, living in Honolulu. I am also vice chair of the Statewide Election Accessibility Needs Advisory Committee, and state secretary of the National Federation of the Blind of Hawaii. And, full disclosure, I am blind.

I am concerned about the Elections Commission's action taken at the October 1, 2025 meeting, "to send a letter to the legislature and advise the chief election officer to return to in person voting in the precinct, hand counting paper ballots, one day voting, ID required, with the exceptions for absentee voting for military and special needs. Votes shall be counted where cast, then reported to the county before transferring ballots.

I've looked at the Elections Commission's October 1 posted meeting agenda and can't find a single reference to a discussion or possible vote on return to in person voting; point being, it's arguable that this motion was a Sunshine law violation. Not absolutely sure about that, but I am sure that this motion absolutely failed to meet any reasonable standard of transparency.

About the substance, we want our elections to be valid, secure, and accessible, but this doesn't require return to inperson voting. In fact, there is no assurance that return to in-person voting will solve the integrity problems alleged and won't lead to many more. I've seen this over and over again in states on the mainland, where allegations of election fraud are made even when the procedures include every point of Commissioner Cushnie's motion.

More than procedures, mail-in or in-person, it's important that the public must be able to trust the election results. It's also important that the Elections Commission should work hard to support and build this trust, not undermine it. It's actually possible to do oversight in ways that support, not divide. I hope you will try to do that. It's your duty.

About the motion itself, exceptions to in-person voting are proposed for absentee, military, and special needs voters. Being blind, I guess I'm a so-called special needs voter, and I object to the exception. if mail-in voting is corrupt by definition, why should I and others be expected to use the corrupt system, while everyone else follows the Commissioner Cushnie rule, presumably less corrupt?

Besides, if special needs voters cast ballots in a different way than most other voters, the special needs voters will be singled out and distinguished from the mainstream. That looks like separate but equal to me. Is one voting system for the public and a different one for special needs consistent with the Help America Vote Act or what's left of the Voting Rights Act? That's what I would have said if given notice of Commissioner Cushnie's return to in person voting motion.

Please do what you can to build up, not beat down, our voting system in Hawaii. This is your responsibility as members of the state's Elections Commission. Mahalo for considering my testimony.

Our family supports mail in ballots

ALOHA CHAIR MICHAEL CURTIS, AND DISTINGUISHED COMMITTEE MEMBERS. My name is Patricia A Johnson. I reside in Ala Moana in Honolulu Hi 96814.

Here are several key reasons why I believe mail-in voting is important — especially for ensuring fair, accessible elections:

My mother was a senior in her 90's (passed just recently at 100 with full cognitive capability) relied heavily on mail ballots to exercise her right to vote despite her lack of mobility. For the sake of others like my mother and the aging baby boomers, please retain mail ballots.

As lifespans become increasingly longer, seniors will become increasingly infirm and immobile and their constitutional right to vote will increasingly be protected by a common-sense vote-by-mail alternative.

Senior or disabled citizens need mail in ballots, but also families, especially single parents with young children who balance work and home can benefit from mail in ballots to encourage participation.

Mail ballots are a way to improve voter turnout. Making it easier to exercise your right to vote means greater participation. Colorado recently did a study to find that all-mail voting in Colorado increased voter turnout by 9.4 percentage points overall. The turnout effect for Coloradans who are categorized as likely Republicans or likely Democrats is almost identical – an increase of approximately 8 percentage points. Independents experienced the most significant turnout boost of nearly 12 percentage points.

Sadly, many Republican-control legislatures have tried to constrain mail-in voting in response to widely debunked claims of large-scale voter fraud during the 2020 general election. The National Committee believes that the best system of voting is one that encourages the maximum number of legitimate votes cast, with safety and convenience being two essential

pillars of such a system. Given the advantages and encouraging results of the nation's vote-by-mail experience, and the lack of evidence of voter fraud, the National Committee questions why so many states are moving in the opposite direction. All these proposals constitute an attack on the ability of seniors to exercise their right to vote. This is particularly ironic given the fact that some GOP legislators expanded vote-by-mail to capture the senior vote which has generally sided with Republicans in this century.

More reasons to support mail ballots.

1. Expands access and convenience

- 1. Mail-in voting allows people who might find in-person voting difficult (due to mobility issues, illness, disability, caregiving duties, travel, or work schedules) to cast a ballot from home.
- 2. It gives voters extra time to review the ballot at home rather than being rushed at the polling place.
- 3. In jurisdictions where mail ballots are the default or widely available, participation tends to increase. For example, in one analysis of counties in the state of Oregon, turnout jumped when they moved to all-mail ballots.

2. Helps maintain health, safety, and flexibility

- 1. During situations like the COVID-19 pandemic (or for voters concerned about health or public gatherings), mail-in voting allows for exercising the right to vote without risking exposure or requiring travel.
- 2. It offers flexibility for voters with unpredictable schedules, those living far from polling places, or those facing transportation or mobility barriers.

3. Supports administrative efficiency and cost-effectiveness

- 1. Conducting an election with many mail ballots (and fewer in-person polling stations) can reduce the strain of staffing, training poll workers, and managing many physical polling sites.
- 2. It can help election administrators better manage voter rolls, update addresses, and process ballots in a methodical way.

4. Doesn't inherently favor any party and can maintain electoral integrity.

- 1. Research indicates that mail-in voting by itself doesn't systematically favor one political party over another.
- 2. Numerous studies and organizations find that voting by mail can be done securely for example, signature verification, tracking of ballots, and post-election audits are in place in many jurisdictions.

5. Encourages broader civic participation

- 1. By lowering some logistical and time-based barriers to voting, mail-in voting can engage voters who might otherwise skip voting because in-person options are inconvenient.
- 2. It can help ensure that more voices are heard in the democratic process, making the electorate more representative.

Some caveats and things to watch

- 1. Mail-in voting still requires secure processes: timely mailing and receipt of ballots, clear instructions, good tracking, and sound signature or identity verification systems.
- 2. Some ballots are rejected due to technical issues (e.g., missing signatures, late arrival) which means voter education is important.
- 3. While research shows the risk of widespread fraud is very low in states with established mail-in systems, maintaining voter confidence requires transparency and best practices.

Aloha Commission Members,

I am testifying in support of maintaining mail-in-ballots only in Hawaii and strongly oppose regressing to in-person voting only for the following reasons:

—There is no reason to require in-person voting. Fraudulent practices are cited as a reason to require in-person voting, but scrutinization of elections has shown the amount of fraud connected with mail-in voting is so minuscule and negligible, it is insignificant. The voter fraud with in-person voting is similar to that with mail-in voting. It is insignificant. Over the past 13 to 38 years. Voter fraud is so rare it is considered insignificant. A review of the 2016 election found four documented cases of voter fraud. The Washington Post found 31 cases of voter impersonation out of 1 billion ballots cast from 2000 to 2014. These numbers are insignificant.

—It is a waste of time and money to revert to in-person voting and counter-productive. Voter turn-out in Hawaii is dismal, so regressing to the inconvenience of demanding in-person voting will lead to even less voter turn-out. This is a bad outcome. Why make it harder for people to vote, when they already seem to have a difficult time accomplishing the act of voting? Mail-in voting is convenient and easy. Everyone can do it. People don't have to take time off work to drive to a polling station. They don't have to pay for child care to go vote. Some people are not able to leave their jobs to vote. An owner of a small business may not have anyone to cover them so, in order to vote, they would have to leave their business unattended and lose income. They may choose not to lose income in order to vote. People should not be faced with decisions like this just to vote.

—With mail-in ballots every eligible voter receives a ballot in the mail before the election, which gives them plenty of time to review and read up on the candidates and measures, and therefore be much better informed when they vote. It is convenient and easy, especially for people who have little to no time to drive to a polling station and stand in line to vote. In-person voting is impossible for many people. Many don't have transportation to polling stations, or they can't afford paying for transportation to polls. Many people don't feel safe going to polling stations. Demanding in-person voting disenfranchises voters in poorer communities without means for transportation to polling stations, people in rural communities with no bus lines to polling stations, as well as the disabled, and the elderly. We the people, means all the people, not just those with the means and ability to get to a polling station.

—It is discriminatory to require people to vote in-person. Demanding in-person voting, and the inconvenience and logistics associated with that, is just another way to disenfranchise voters. Many people, for a multitude of reasons cannot safely go to a polling station to vote. Those who are immunocompromised would put their health, sometimes their life, at risk if they did inperson voting.

It is very difficult to impossible for many people with disabilities to get to a polling station. Some people may need to avoid polling stations to protect the health of the community. They should be able vote by mail.

—Studies have shown that anyone manning a polling station in uniform, such as a policeman or member of the military, intimidates voters. Currently, we have a President who plans to station members of the justice department at polling stations in California for the November election. Measures like these, particularly in communities of color and poorer communities, historically, intimidates voters and discriminates. It is intended to intimidate voters, disenfranchise voters and deny them their voting rights. In-person voting opens the doors to this kind of intimidation.

Thank you for considering my testimony and viewpoint regarding support for mail-in voting.

If there are documented problems with voting by mail, then please explore practical, politically feasible solutions. Recommending something infeasible at best won't help and at worst will make you look foolish.

Elected officials want to get reelected. That's why most State legislators will oppose legislation which prevents most or all Hawaii voters from voting by mail. In 2018, the last year Hawaii voters were given a choice, more Hawaii voters voted by mail than voted in person. Absentee ballots were 56% of the total Hawaii general election ballots cast in 2018.

Banning voting by mail here would be a giant leap backward.

Before Hawai'i first voted by mail in 2020, we had the worst voter turnout percentage of any state in the nation. But in 2020, 58% of registered voters voted, a sharp rise from 38.6% in the 2016 election. Similar results have occurred in other states when they adopted this method, though our increase was the most dramatic.

Compared to voting by mail from home, having to go back to in-person-only voting would make it more difficult for many in Hawai'i to vote at all: seniors, people with disabilities or lack of transportation, people who live in remote rural areas, people who work more than one job, people who don't have enough time or physical stamina to stand in long lines, pregnant women, parents of small children, full-time caregivers.

And where would they vote even if they could? The infrastructure of traditional polling places no longer exists here and would be very expensive to rebuild—the reservation and equipping of polling places throughout the state, the staff training to operate and coordinate them, the recruitment of volunteer poll workers, the increased complexity of collecting and tallying votes cast, and the massive task of educating the public on the location of their specific polling places. All this when the state budget is strained trying to buffer the loss of revenue and programs from the shut-down and the federal administration's budget cuts.

Banning vote-by-mail would clearly discourage and decrease election participation in Hawai'i. Why do it? States like Oregon and Arizona have used voting by mail safely and effectively as their primary method for years. No legal challenges, even in the contentious aftermath of the 2020 election, have found evidence of error or misuse that came anywhere near to affecting the election results in their states.

Yet just this week, our current President has attempted —by executive decree—to ban voting-by-mail nationwide. Fortunately for voters, the U.S. Constitution grants the power to organize and regulate elections to the states, not to the federal government. To ban voting by mail for all of us as a fix for as yet unproven irregularities would do us a serious injustice. Shouldn't a free society encourage and enable all its citizens to vote, rather than create obstacles to exercising that fundamental right?

Ballot tracking: Hawaii voters can use a tracking service to monitor their ballot's status, receiving alerts when it is mailed, received, and accepted for counting. This increases transparency and provides peace of mind.

Unique ballot identifiers: Each ballot return envelope has an individualized barcode, allowing officials to track it and prevent duplicate voting.

Paper trail: Ballots marked on paper provide a verifiable record for post-election audits to ensure accuracy.

Increased voter turnout

Proven to boost participation: Studies show that universal vote-by-mail systems tend to increase voter turnout. In 2020, Hawaii saw a 14% jump in registered voter turnout compared to 2016.

Particularly effective for key groups: Research indicates that mail-in voting has a large impact on turnout for young, Black, and Latino voters, who historically vote at lower rates.

More time to vote and research: Voters receive their ballots weeks before Election Day, giving them more time to research candidates and issues. They can complete the ballot at their own pace, and at their convenience, rather than being confined to a single day.

Avoids logistical barriers: Mail-in voting removes the need to travel to a specific polling place, wait in line, or take time off work. This is particularly beneficial for voters who have busy schedules, are elderly, have disabilities, or live in remote rural areas,

The only reason we are having this discussion about eliminating mail in ballots is because Republicans in Hawaii (and in the other states) want to limit voter participation.

Mail-in voting in Hawaii is relatively new. It has evolved from the "no-excuse" absentee voting legislation of 1993, the special elections legislation allowing mail-in ballots in 2003, through various iterations until finally passing Act 136 that enacts elections by mail statewide beginning in 2020. (https://elections.hawaii.gov/wp-content/uploads/Report-to-Legislature-20191104.pdf)

Claims by Republicans of voter fraud are patently false. 20 years of data reviewed in the USA of vote by mail fraud shows that out of 250 million ballots cast by mail only 143 were fraudulent (Amber McReynolds, the CEO of the National Vote at Home Institute, and Charles Stewart, director of the MIT Election Data and Science Lab). That is only a 0.00006% fraud rate.

Although universal mail in voting does not increase voter turnout significantly overall some studies found increased turnout for young voters and voters of color when they received ballots by mail. Exactly the sector of the population the Republicans are targeting for voter suppression.

It is the 21st century. Setting aside partisan politics, mail in voting is simply more convenient for many people and should continue to be an option for voters in Hawaii, specially for seniors, the disabled and people living in the most rural areas of the islands. Having many different voting models assures that Hawaii's diverse population has a safe way to vote in free and fair elections.



By mail using the postage-paid return envelope. Be mindful of USPS delivery times to ensure it arrives by 7:00 p.m. on Election Day.

At a designated ballot drop box in your county.

At a voter service center in your county.

Signature verification: Once your ballot is received, election officials will compare the signature on your return envelope to the one on file in your voter registration record.

In-person voting: If you need assistance or prefer to vote in person, you can visit a voter service center. These centers are open 10 business days before Election Day and also offer same-day registration.

My reading of the P.I.G. report leads me to conclude that it is, for the most part, a solution in search of a problem. The authors of the report justify eliminating vote-by-mail altogether because "Modifying the system will require trial and error that will take years to accomplish." Putting aside arguments regarding the accuracy of that claim, it seems worthwhile to ensure the continuance of a popular and broadly used method of voting. In the 2024 election, for example, only 4.5 percent of ballots were cast in person.

The P.I.G. authors propose drastic remedies: 1) eliminate vote-by-mail, 2) fire the State Elections Chief, and 3) initiate an external, independent, manual audit of the 2024 General Election. The authors of the report claim these actions will increase transparency and trust in our election results. I doubt that since there is no fail-safe way to satisfy the objections of election deniers and skeptics.

The P.I.G. report has undermined any transparency and cooperation state and county election officials might have extended. Since the Commission seems unable to conduct a unified examination of how the system might be improved, the wagons are circling. Fanning of the flames of suspicion seems to have pushed Commission members to consider an expensive and long audit to exonerate the election process and alleviate their pain (hours-long and contentious meetings, my goodness!).

"Voters can trust in the safety and security of the mail-in voting process, regardless of recent politicized claims to the contrary. Since 2000, more than 250 million votes have been cast via mailed-out ballots in all 50 states, according to the <u>National Vote at Home</u> Institute.

Here are five reasons you can vote by mail with confidence.

1. Voting by mail isn't new.

Absentee voting dates to the Civil War, when several states granted members of the military the opportunity to vote when they were "absent" from their home districts. Now, every state has some type of vote-by-mail process. In five states—Oregon, Washington, Hawaii, Utah, and Colorado—mail balloting is the primary method of voting. In 2018, a quarter of the electorate voted by mail.

2. It's difficult to request a mail-in ballot or cast a vote by mail using someone else's name.

It's a misconception that because there's no way of knowing who's requesting or voting a ballot, it would be easy to apply for or vote a ballot by mail in someone else's name. Every step of the vote-by-mail process includes security procedures to ensure the voter requesting the ballot is the voter receiving and voting the ballot.

The most common way to verify that mail ballots are coming from the intended voter is through signature verification. Voters must sign an affidavit on the ballot envelope. When the ballot is returned to the election office, election officials examine and verify every signature, comparing it with voter registration records or other documents that contain the voter's signature.

Some states require copies of identification documents or that their envelopes are signed before witnesses or are notarized.

3. Nationwide security procedures protect the delivery of mail-in ballots.

Mailed ballots typically are delivered to and picked up from the post office by two election office staff and transported in a secure container. These ballots are also

processed by teams of trained election staff to ensure the integrity of the counting process.

4. Vote-by-mail programs do not favor one political party over another.

Researchers have conducted many studies to determine whether a partisan bias results from election reforms designed to make it easier to vote, of which vote-by-mail is one. A recent study by the Stanford Institute for Economic Policy Research found that "(1) vote-by-mail does not appear to affect either party's share of turnout; (2) vote-by-mail does not appear to increase either party's vote share; and (3) vote-by-mail modestly increases overall average turnout rates, in line with previous estimates."

The researchers say their findings essentially dispel concerns that mail-in voting would cause a major electoral shift toward one party.

5. Voter impersonation and ballot falsification are exceedingly rare.

Based on a meticulous review of elections that were investigated for voter fraud, the Brennan Center for Justice found minuscule incident rates of ineligible individuals casting ballots at the polls – no more than 0.0025 percent. Numerous reports have confirmed this finding that voter impersonation is exceedingly rare. Research shows that voter fraud is similarly rare with mail ballots.

I am writing to submit testimony in support of mail-in voting in the State of Hawai'i.

Mail-in Voting ensures every registered and eligible voter has the opportunity to exercise their right to vote.

As a teacher, mail-in voting allowed me to vote. I was a teacher for a large private school and lived 20 miles from campus. Due to traffic on the H1West I was never able to get to my polling location before the polls closed on election days. I have retired from teaching after 27 years in the class room; however, I continue to work in town while living in 'Ewa Beach. Mail-in Voting allows me to earn a full day's pay and vote. I have a Master's Degree. I am an educated voter who has an increased risk of disenfranchisement if mail-in voting is eliminated because taking time to vote will cost me pay from work.

My mother is my co-parent. I am a widow and she helps me with child care while I work. Mail-in Voting allows her to ensure she can cast her ballot without worrying about getting my children to and from school, supervising their online classes on virtual days (my children attend a hybrid school with only 2 days per week on campus and all other instruction being completed at home through online platforms), and getting them to and from practices for sports and other extra-curricular activities. My mother is a retired teacher and high school librarian with a Master's Degree. She is an educated voter who has an increased risk of disenfranchisement if mail-in voting is eliminated.

My mother-in-law is physically disabled. She is unable to leave her bedroom due to her physical disabilities and requires adult aid and care to move from her bed to her wheelchair, from her bed to the commode, from her wheelchair to the commode, etc. She is unable to move herself. Additionally, she is obese and requires an extra wide wheelchair that does not fit through the doors of the Handi-Van transports. She is unable to get into or out of a passenger vehicle due to her physical disabilities. Although my mother-in-law is physically disabled, her mind is in excellent condition! My mother-in-law is current and up to date on international and national events. She is an educated voter and will be disenfranchised if mail-in voting is eliminated.

The push to end mail-in voting by Donald Trump and the GOP is an effort to disenfranchise voters because they know the Trump & GOP policies are unpopular and are not in the best interest of the people or the country. My name is Katie Keim. I have been a blind businesswoman in Hawai'i for over 25 years. I am a member of the Statewide Election Accessibility Needs Advisory Committee, and statewide 2nd Vice President of the National Federation of the Blind of Hawai'i.

I'm testifying today representing myself, as an individual citizen of our state residing in Honolulu.

I am very concerned about the Elections Commission's action taken at the October 1, 2025 meeting, "to send a letter to the legislature and advise the chief election officer to return to in person voting in the precinct, hand counting paper ballots, one day voting, ID required, with the exceptions for absentee voting for military and special needs. Votes shall be counted where cast, then reported to the county before transferring ballots.

In reviewing October 1, 2025, meetings agenda, I can't find a reference to a discussion or voting on return to in person, I am certain this motion absolutely failed to meet any reasonable standard of transparency and oversight of our public meeting regulation "Sunshine Law".

More than procedures, mail-in or in-person, it is important that the public must be able to trust the election results. It seems to me this action going back to in-person is reactionary rather than a well thought out step to ensure voting citizens rights and transparency to the public, not resolving any issues that are currently being perceived, rather creating more.

The responsibility to support and build trust, not undermine it, is my hope for the Elections

Commission, it is your duty as a public servant. I am keenly aware of what is the responsibility of all public servants, having been a public servant myself in Hawai'i at one time, it is very much your responsibility as members of the state's Elections Commission.

About the motion itself, exceptions to in-person voting are proposed for absentee, military, and special needs voters. Being blind, it assumes I am a special needs voter, I have serious objections to this exception. if mail-in voting is corrupt, why should I and others be expected to use the corrupt system, while everyone else follows the Commissioner Cushnie rule, presumably less corrupt? When special needs voters cast ballots in a different way than most other voters, the special needs voters will be singled out and distinguished from the mainstream. That becomes a discriminatory action at the least.

My name is Rebecca Soon from Waiākea Uka on Hawai'i Island, and I am submitting this written testimony in strong support of preserving and expanding accessible mail-in voting for our state.

Mail-in voting ensures that people who may face barriers to going to in-person polling places still have full and meaningful access to cast their ballot. This includes kūpuna, folks working multiple jobs, caregivers, those living in rural or remote parts of our islands, voters with limited mobility, and anyone needing flexibility because of health, transportation, or schedule constraints. When mail-in voting was instituted we saw a meaningful rise in participation among Hawai'I voters.

When mail-in voting is restricted or eliminated, we risk creating a system where only those with time, resources, or physical ability can vote.

Mail-in voting is not a giveaway to insecurity; rather, states like ours and others have decades of experience that show it can be secure, verifiable and transparent.

Having a trusted alternative – one that voters can participate in from home, sign, return, track and verify – builds the integrity of our democratic process. Limiting or removing this option under the pretext of "security concerns" risks undermining trust in the system, when in fact the concerns may be about access rather than actual vulnerability.

Efforts to roll back mail-in voting are not simply administrative changes — they carry the real risk of voter suppression. When the choices are fewer and harder, the default becomes: the voices of working families, rural residents, Native Hawaiians, and others bearing the greatest burden of cost, time or distance will be muted.

In our culture, the concept of kuleana emphasizes that all of us should have responsibility and access to participate. To narrow one of the most inclusive and convenient paths to the ballot is to erode that kuleana for many. Maintaining robust mail-in voting honors the principle that democracy works best when it is inclusive, accessible, and held in trust by every member of our 'ohana.

In closing, I respectfully urge the Commission to safeguard and strengthen mail-in voting in Hawai'i—ensuring that it remains a thriving option, not a diminished one. Let us commit to a system where every eligible voter, regardless of where they live, how they travel, or how their schedule plays out, can vote with dignity, ease, and confidence that their ballot counts.
