This Click List shows how to use the Map Window Tools for moving around in the Map Window.

### Click List 6 – Create tab: Map Window Tools

The Create tab has several tools for moving around in the Map Window. The main one I use is the Pan tool (it looks like a hand) to click and drag the map to a new position.

#### “Pan” Tool

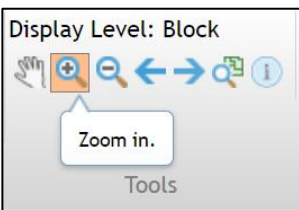


Click on the Pan tool (the hand) to make it the active tool. The orange box around it shows that it's the active tool.

Move the cursor over a location on the map, left-click and hold. As you move the cursor, the map will move along with it. Release and the tool will stop, you can move the cursor as usual.

#### “Zoom In” Tool

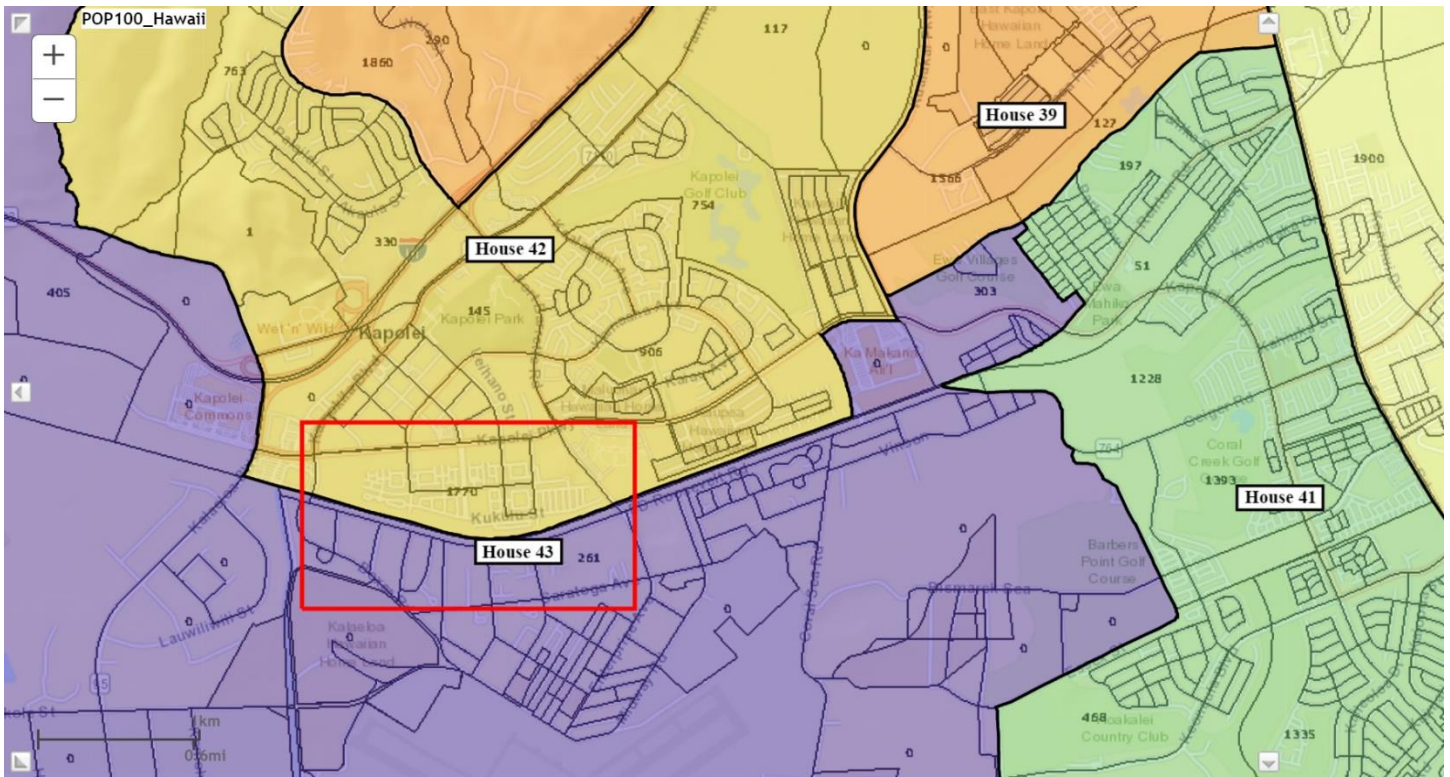
Another useful tool is Zoom In to quickly zoom in to a certain area on the map.



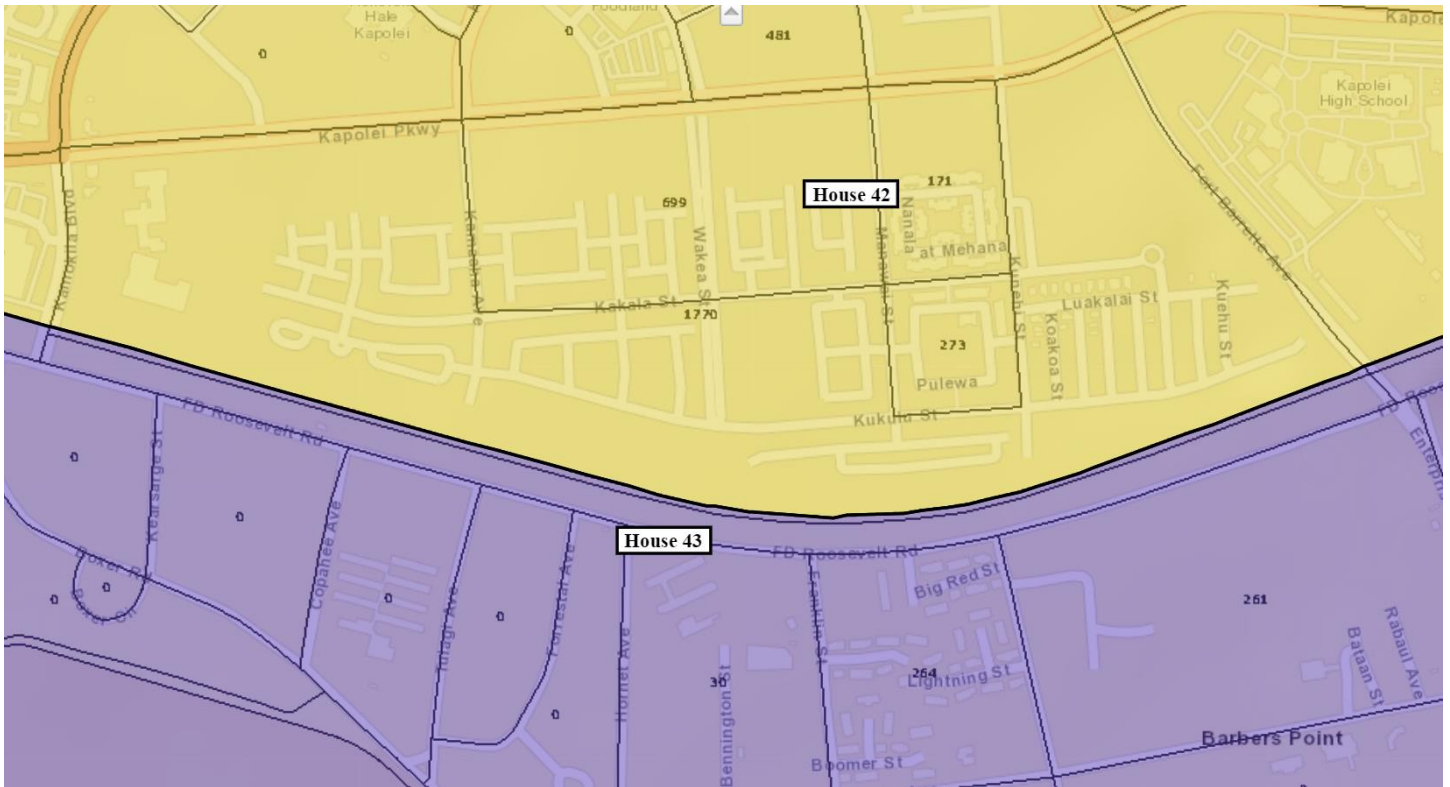
Click on the Zoom In tool (the + magnifier) to make it the active tool. The orange box around it shows that it's the active tool.

Move the cursor over a location on the map, left-click and hold. As you move the cursor, a red box will appear. Release and the Zoom In tool zooms the map to the area within the red box you drew.

Here's the map showing the red box drawn using the Zoom In tool:

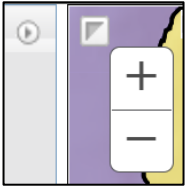


And here's the map after it's zoomed in:



The black lines outline each census block. The black numbers within each block show the population within that block. Note that as you zoom in you can begin to see more of the population numbers within each census block.

There are other tools, but Pan and Zoom In are the ones I use the most.

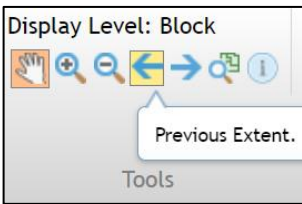


You can also use the + and – buttons on the upper left of the map to zoom in and zoom out.

And if you have a mouse wheel, you can use it to zoom in and out. The map will continue to show the area where the cursor is as you zoom in and out.

### “Previous Extent” Button

I do sometimes want to go back to an area I was at before. The Previous Extent button will do this.

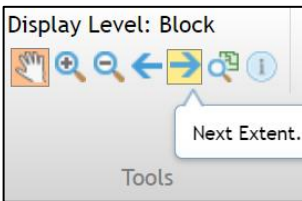


Click on the Previous Extent button (the left arrow) and the map will go back to the area it was previously showing. Each time you click the button it will go back to the next previous extent.

It does not change your active tool.

### “Next Extent” Button

Sometimes, after I’ve gone back to a previous extent, I want to return forward to where I was. The Next Extent button will do this.



Click on the Next Extent button (the right arrow) and the map will go forward to the next area. Each time you click the button it will go forward to the next extent.

It does not change your active tool.
