Aloha Chair Mugiishi and the Reapportionment Commission...

During the State of Hawaii Reapportionment Commission meeting on October 14, 2021 public testimony was received and Proposed Legislative Redistricting Plans by the Technical Committee Permitted Interaction Group were presented.

Some of the public testimony indicated displeasure that the Enchanted Lake community in Kailua, the Portlock community in Hawaii Kai, and a significant part of Manoa Valley would all be split between two house districts, diluting the voices of Kailua, Hawaii Kai, and Manoa. Additionally, Waimanalo community concerns were raised about the complexity of becoming linked with Hawaii Kai (Portlock) in addition to Kailua.

I constructed a redistricting proposal to see if each of these communities could be kept together, using both Ka'ena Point and Makapu'u Point as boundaries, and as anchors HD 17 (East Oahu), HD 51 (Windward Oahu), and HD 44 (Leeward Oahu). In the process I discovered the population deviations between all of the Oahu districts could also be significantly reduced.

I followed the rules for compact contiguous districts as much as possible. I used mountain ridges, highways, and streams as district boundaries as much as possible. I kept neighborhoods intact as much as possible; examples:

Lanikai/Enchanted Lake/Waimanalo kept intact as HD51 -- virtually identical to the current district (59 people moved)

Hawaii Kai kept intact as HD17 -- 1,751 people added using the west edge of Hawaii Kai Manoa kept intact as HD23 -- all of Manoa Valley is kept as one

This plan has better population balance vs. the Commission's technical group proposal:

24 Districts 0 +/- .99% (vs. only 6 Districts)

11 Districts > 0.99% but less than 1.40% (vs. only 2 Districts)

0 Districts > 1.40% (vs. 27 Districts)

Total deviation 2.65% (-1.25% to 1.40%) versus 8.54% (-4.30% to 4.24%)

I only looked at making the districts compact, contiguous, geographically consistent, and as equal in population as possible; there was no political calculus involved. The attached brief has a detailed map for each of the 35 Oahu districts I constructed.

I hope this proposal can be used as a starting point for further development by the Commission in keeping more communities together. It was submitted and can be found at https://redistricting.hawaii.esriemcs.com (Open Plan > Shared Plan > Everyone).

I have already submitted testimony (below) which included alternative Oahu House and Senate plans that I developed.

FYI, I have modified the PowerPoints to add side-by-side, district-by-district comparison maps of my proposal with the existing district to make it easier to see (attached). The included numbers for each district are the population deviations for each district under both my proposed alternative and the current district.

I started with the current districts and added/subtracted neighborhoods to make the populations better match the average population target. The current HD51 was almost on target to begin with, but HD51 oddly included a sliver of Pohakupu and was missing a sliver of Enchanted Lake, so I made both of those neighborhoods more whole.

Military populations no longer count (unless they pay Hawaii taxes), so HD50 lost MCBH population and had to gain some from elsewhere. HD49 had a population surplus and included the Maunawili side of Kailua, so I expanded HD50 mauka toward Castle Junction (Kalanianaole/Kamehameha/Pali intersection), so now Kailua is simply HD51 & HD50.

And so on...all around the island.

One other improvement was, by starting with HD17 keeping Hawaii Kai intact, rather than splitting valleys (the TG plan splits Manoa Valley), I was able to keep all of the East Oahu valleys intact in single districts.

HD20 is unchanged and I didn't run out of East Oahu population until I reached the odd shaped HD31/32. HD32 became a Leeward Oahu district consisting of the densely populated area east of Barber's Point and west of Ewa Beach.

I hope this helps to see the changes better.

I hope these Oahu House and Senate proposals can be used as a starting point for further development by the Commission in not mixing East Oahu and Windward Oahu communities in one district and keeping more communities together.


Some of the public testimony included displeasure that the Enchanted Lake community in Kailua, the Portlock community Hawaii Kai, and a significant part of Manoa Valley would all be split between two house districts, diluting the voices of ailua, Hawaii Kai, and Manoa. Additionally, Waimanalo community concerns were raised about the complexity of becoming the with Hawaii Kai (Portlock) in addition to Kailua.

constructed a redistricting proposal to see if each of these communities could be kept together, using both Ka'ena Point and Makapu'u Point as boundaries, and as anchors HD 17 (East Oahu), HD 51 (Windward Oahu), and HD 44 (Leeward Oahu). In the process I discovered the population deviations between the districts could also be significantly reduced.



Aloha Commissioners,

I am Springer Kaye, a 20-year resident of Honomu and a past Honomu Village Association President. I had previously submitted testimony about the proposed line dividing Senate Districts 1 and 4, which appeared on island-scale maps to divide Honomu Town in half along Akaka Falls Road. I was able to find the interactive map and zoom in further, and can now see that the proposed line follows Honomu Stream.

Traditionally, the line between Honomu and Pepeekeo is just a bit further south, following Kapehu Stream. This is evidenced by ahupua'a or watershed maps, which include all the lands that drain into Honomu stream, from the north and the south, in the Honomu Watershed. The southern edge of this watershed runs out to Pohakumanu Bay, and includes Kohola Point in Honomu. The 40 or so people living in this area believe we live in Honomu, we share a Honomu Zip Code, participate in the Honomu Village Association (HVA) meetings and email lists, and attend the HVA Holiday Party. My own property was once part of the Honomu Plantation operations facility.

Moving the line to Kapehu Stream would keep us with our town in Senate District 4, which is our current district. The line could follow Kapehu Stream from the ocean to almost the very top of the stream, where it intersects a census block boundary that runs north to Honomu Stream, at about the same elevation as Akaka `Falls. From there it could follow the currently proposed line.

It looks like this small change in numbers would be in the "right" direction, slightly improving the variance from the ideal population in SD4. Your assistance in keeping our town members together in the same district would be most appreciated.

Mahalo for your kind consideration. I will try to log onto the Zoom to provide testimony Wednesday October 27th.

Aloha Chair Mugiishi and the Reapportionment Commission,

'O Kimeona Kane kēia, kupa wau O Waimānalo. Mahalo nui iā 'oukou no ka hana pono no Hawai'i nei.

I am Kimeona Kane, born into and a proud member of the Waimānalo community. I currently Chair the Waimānalo Neighborhood Board and am a Hawaiian Cultural Practitioner teaching our community and beyond the art and lifestyle of Uhau Humu Pōhaku. My testimony today is NOT a representation of the Waimānalo Neighborhood Board, rather, as a lifelong member of the Waimānalo community, my home, where I look forward to the day when my essence will be scattered with my family in the beautiful waters of Kaiona.

When I first learned of the Reapportionment Process, I was very overwhelmed and ignorant to the ideas and reasonings. I want to thank the Commission and support staff for providing the opportunity for the community to express their desires, concerns and ask the questions necessary to gain a better understanding. While I do not believe that the statement, "it is what it is" made at the prior meeting by a commissioner at 02:10:46 in the video, best represents the wellbeing of the communities this process is intended to serve, I recognize the incredible efforts made to see the bigger picture. That same big picture, could potentially become a ten year problem for some communities that they will have to simply absorb, and I feel that reality is a negligent diservice. The complexity of this process is one thing for sure, however, the oversight of communities need to be focused in on to ensure that they are best represented as well.

I stand in opposition of the Technical Group Plan which would stretch House District 51 into the Hawai'i Kai Community. The idea to not utilize the two anchor points as previously done, is rather alarming and hopefully there is merit to the neglect of Makapu'u Point as a valid anchor point, as it has served as prior. Additionally, the error that is Senate District 25, should also be adjusted to best provide the communities equal representation. While I do not speak for other communities, and my testimony is specific to the District boundaries that include Waimānalo, I do understand and acknowledge the potential impacts other communites may face as a result of this plan. As a farming, ranching, rural and heavily Native Hawaiian dense Community occupying Hawaiian Homestead Land, I am concerned that a redistrcting as such, will potentially impact the resources available to the community, is a gateway to urbanization, and threatens the essence of the community I have grown up into. There are several disparities with Waimānalo in comparison to the Portlock community and with other demographic and socioeconomic similar areas that are proposed to be removed, the representation of each community, Kailua, Waimānalo and Hawai'i Kai will be strained.

In closing, I deeply appreciate the efforts of the Commission, support staff, members of the public, and others, for their committement to serving our community. While I do not have a map to offer today, Thursday October 28, 2021, I am working with the software to assist in the solution finding. I appreciate the time and format allowed to us as community members to weigh in on these very critical decisions that have at minimal, a ten year impact.

At its regularly scheduled meeting of October 26, 2021, the Hawaii Kai Neighborhood Board voted unanimously (13 Ayes, 0 Nays, 0 Abstentions) to approve a resolution that opposes the 2021 Reapportionment Maps developed by the Reapportionment Commission's Technical Group. This letter serves as a cover letter to the Board's Resolution #21-3, attached.

The Hawaii Kai Neighborhood Board opposes the proposed reapportionment plans for House Districts 17 and 51, and Senate Districts 9 and 25, for many reasons, detailed in the attached Resolution #21-3. To briefly state a few,

- the proposed plan fragments the Hawaii Kai Community and diminishes the community's voice,
- the proposed plan creates a non-contiguous district that straddles Congressional Districts 1 and 2, resulting in an incongruent contortion wrapping around the Kaiwi Coast,
- the proposed plan ignores the geographic boundary of Makapu'u Point that naturally divides the Windward and Leeward sides of the Koolau's,
- the proposed plan ignores the Hawaii Kai community's long-time commitment to preserve and protect the Kaiwi Coast for residents and visitors alike, successfully obtaining designation of the Kaiwi Coast as a State Scenic Byway and developing a Maunalua to Makapu'u Corridor Management Plan approved by the State Department of Transportation,
- the proposed plan seeks to move neighborhoods out of the Hawaii Kai community who share a common socio-economic-political infrastructure with Hawaii Kai and East Honolulu neighborhoods,
- the proposed plan motivated the Neighborhood Board chairs of Hawaii Kai, Waimanalo and Kailua to work together to oppose the Commission's proposed plan and to unanimously support the alternate plans submitted by Bill Hicks for the Oahu House and Senate Districts for the Commission to consider.

The Hawaii Kai Neighborhood Board strongly urges the Reapportionment Commission to redraw the boundary configurations for House Districts 17 and 51 and for Senate Districts 9 and 25, to maintain the geographic boundary of Makapu'u Point as the natural division between these House and Senate Districts, and to allow the Hawaii Kai community to remain intact.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on this important issue.

WHEREAS, the proposed reapportionment plan for House District 17 fragments the intact Hawaii Kai community by incorporating the neighborhoods of Queen's Gate, Koko Villas, Laulima, parts of Kalama Valley, Kaiser High School and its environs, Portlock, and the Kaiwi Coastline into House District 51, thereby separating them from the current Hawaii Kai community, and

WHEREAS, the proposed reapportionment plan exacerbates the error committed in the 2010 reapportionment when parts of Kalama Valley and Portlock were placed in the current Senate District 25, and

WHEREAS, the proposed change to combine portions of House District 17 with House District 51 creates a non-contiguous district that straddles Congressional Districts 1 and 2, thereby not wholly containing either of the areas in one Congressional District as per Commission precept, and

WHEREAS, the Hawaii Kai geographic area in its current boundaries is an intact community and the reapportionment proposal for House Districts 17 and 51 splits both districts into an illogical, incongruent contortion wrapping around the Kaiwi Coastline, and

WHEREAS, the Hawaii Kai community for many decades has been instrumental in helping to protect and preserve the Kaiwi Coastline for Hawaii residents and visitors alike, has assisted in preserving beaches along the coastline such as Sandy Beach and Wawamalu Beach, has supported the preservation of Hanauma Bay, and has promoted conservation of the natural coastal landscape, most recently with a community purchase of 187 acres across from Makapu'u, and

WHEREAS, the Hawaii Kai community succeeded in obtaining designation of the Kaiwi Coastline as a Hawaii State Scenic Byway and has developed a Maunalua to Makapu'u Corridor Management Plan approved by the State Department of Transportation, and

WHEREAS, the Hawaii Kai community has committed time, energy and resources to be the primary stewards of the scenic and fragile Kaiwi Coastline, and

WHEREAS, the Queen's Gate, Koko Villas, Laulima, Kalama Valley, Portlock communities and Kaiser High School and its environs are geographically, historically and logically integral parts of the Hawaii Kai community, and

WHEREAS, the socio-economic-political infrastructure of the Queen's Gate, Koko Villas, Laulima, Kalama Valley, Portlock neighborhoods and Kaiser High School and its environs are coherent with the Hawaii Kai community as a whole, as well as the East Honolulu communities, and

WHEREAS, Districts 17 and 51 are currently clearly demarcated with Makapu'u Point Lighthouse as a natural geographic boundary, and political dividing line between the Windward and Leeward sides of the Koolau Mountains, and

Aloha and thank you for taking my comments into consideration while drawing new boundaries for the reapportionment plan for Oahu. My comments are entirely apolitical, and are intended to help, not hinder your work. Public support of your decision is critical to make sure the public continues to have confidence in our electoral system, which results in a fair election with no bias one way or the other. To instill that confidence, your final decision on our electoral districts is of the utmost importance.

I was fortunate to have watched your last meeting via zoom and found the information presented informative and helpful. While I am not a statistician or skilled at map making, I believe I now grasp the intent of the law and the difficulties you have encountered. However, I was surprised to see the map under consideration and was quite disappointed that some basic rules were ignored, such as:

Article IV, Section 6 of the State Constitution:

- 2. No district shall be so drawn as to unduly favor a person or political faction.
- 3. Except in the case of districts encompassing more than one island, districts shall be contiguous.
- 4. Insofar as practicable, districts shall be compact.
- 5. Where possible, district lines shall follow permanent and easily recognized features, such as streets, streams and clear geographical features,

You have already heard from representatives of areas where these basic outlines appear to have been rejected in favor of re-districting to affect an upcoming election. My hope is that you will consider a different approach developed by Bill Hicks of the windward area. His map uses your interactive system to create a "mauka makai ahupua'a" concept, resulting in more traditional lines of demarcation of our districts. His work has met with broad approval and should be seriously taken into consideration before a vote is taken to approve the existing map.

I understand that: "The Commission conducts public hearings and consults with the Advisory Council of each basic island unit during the preparation of the reapportionment plan." Could you please clarify for all of us whether or not public comments and suggestions will be forwarded to the Advisory Council or do we need to submit testimony again to that organization when they meet on November 1? Or will you be forwarding to them all testimony you have received?

Thank you for your service on behalf of the state. You face a difficult task to ensure that districts represent an equal number of permanent residents while also preserving the integrity of communities.

We write on behalf of the Kaka'ako Community Development District which we currently represent. It is a district currently situated entirely within current Senate District 12 and shared by House Districts 22 and 26. As a state-established community development district, it was created to ensure development of residential, commercial and light industrial uses as well as parks and public open spaces for the enjoyment of its residents and visitors. It spans from mauka to makai with the shoreline to be preserved for current and future generations.

In short, Kaka'ako Mauka and Makai form a contiguous neighborhood with deep cultural and historical roots. It is for this reason that the state, in 1978, created the Hawaii Community Development Authority (HCDA) to ensure the stewardship of this urban district.

The Commission's proposed plan has appropriately maintained the community district's integrity in Senate District 12. The House dividing line, however, carves the Ewa-Makai area out of the current House district, shifting Kaka'ako Makai into House District 27 — Downtown/Kalihi — and away from Kaka'ako Mauka.

For the continuing development of the Kaka'ako Community Development District, it is crucial that the total community –both Mauka (of Ala Moana Boulevard) and Makai (from Ala Moana Boulevard to the ocean) remain within the Kaka'ako House District.

Further, there is no resident population in Kaka'ako Makai, nor will there be, since residential building on these shoreline parcels is prohibited by law. Therefore, preserving the integrity of Kaka'ako within one House District will have no population impact now or in the future.

Based on the above, we current Kaka'ako representatives, on behalf of the community where we both currently reside, urge the Reapportionment Commission to reconsider splitting Kaka'ako Makai away from Kaka'ako Mauka. Please, instead, retain the integrity of the Kaka'ako Community Development District within one House and one Senate district as described in the attached map. It would amend the Commission's lines by moving the House District 23 boundary from the current shoreline of Kewalo Basin to the Honolulu Harbor shoreline and deleting the boundary along Ala Moana Boulevard that divides Kaka'ako Makai from Kaka'ako Mauka.



Aloha, Commissioners:

My name is Becky Gardner and I am submitting this testimony on behalf of myself as Principal and Founder of Policy Matters LLC. My comments today are focused on:

- (1) The Commission's statutory authority to ascertain the most accurate population data for the Article IV, Section 4 / Step 1 extraction process;
- (2) The Commission's duty to meaningfully consult with the various county advisory councils; and
- (3) The disruptions the proposed plans will create to the cohesiveness of the communities in the Kaimuki, Diamond Head, and Kapahulu areas.

The Commission's Statutory Authority to Ascertain Most Accurate Population Data

First, what would give me greater confidence that this Commission is doing its due, constitutionally-mandated diligence to make the *most accurate* extraction of non-permanent residents from the total state population is if it, at a bare minimum, were to invoke one of many of its many powers granted by statute – especially since this issue is so contentious. These powers are outlined in HRS Chapter 25.

For example, **HRS Section 25-3** authorizes this Commission to summon appearances, testimony, and documents – under oath - from anyone it deems necessary. **HRS Section 25-4** outlines the steep penalties for failure to answer questions from the Commission completely and truthfully. It does not appear that the Commission has summoned anyone for this purpose in a public forum.

HRS 25-3 provides in relevant part:

"§25-3 Powers. The commission may require all such persons as it deems necessary to appear personally and testify before it and to produce to it all books, records, files, papers, maps and documents as shall appear to be necessary for the purpose of formulating a reapportionment plan. The chairperson of the commission or any member thereof acting on behalf of the chairperson shall have power to administer oaths to persons summoned to appear before the commission and such persons may be questioned, under oath, concerning all matters necessary for the due execution of the duties vested in the commission by the Constitution and by this chapter...[.]

Also, under **HRS Section 25-6**, this Commission has the authority to enlist the cooperation from any state agency. Because of the repeated concerns over the inconsistencies of data from DBEDT and the military, I respectfully request this Commission to ask the military, DBEDT, and the University of Hawaii Social Science Research Institute (SSRI) – from which relevant resident population data was obtained during the 1991 reapportionment, to testify in a public forum as to why DBEDT's population data is inferior to the data set initially provided to you by the military for the purposes of performing the STEP ONE – Article IV Section 4 extraction of non-permanent residents off the top of Hawaii's total population. HRS 25-6 provides in relevant part:

"§25-6 Cooperation. The commission may request and shall receive from every department, division, board, bureau, commission or other agency of the State cooperation and assistance in the performance of its duties."

This Commission has tremendous power and authority to execute its duties, but it has not demonstrated to the public that it has invoked any of these powers to resolve concerns. Thus, I respectfully request this Commission ask the military, DBEDT, and the University of Hawaii Social Science Research Institute (UH testify in a public forum as to why DBEDT's population data is inferior to that provided by the military for the purposes of performing the Step One

The Commission's Statutory Obligation to Consult with Advisory Councils

Second, under **HRS Section 25-2**, this Commission is mandated to consult with the various county advisory councils. Apparently, the Advisory Council for Hawaii County had testified in June 2011 before the 2011 Commission. In 2021, this Commission is only hearing Advisory Council testimony in October – and after it had voted on the specifics for extracting non-permanent residents, and after it had placed on the agenda a vote on a district map proposal – matters to which these advisory councils are perhaps most concerned. HRS 25-2 provides in relevant part:

§25-2 Duties. (a) Legislative reapportionment. The commission shall reapportion the members of each house of the legislature on the basis, method, and criteria prescribed by the Constitution of the United States and article IV of the Hawaii Constitution. Pursuant thereto, the commission shall conduct public hearings and consult with the apportionment advisory council of each basic island unit. . . [.]

Proposed Maps'Disruption to the cohesiveness of the Kaimuki, Diamond Head, and Kapahulu communities.

I have been a member of the Kaimuki Neighborhood Board since 2017, and we currently have two state representatives who report to our board – which seems unusual because the population of a house district (around 50,000 residents) is significantly larger than that of a Neighborhood Board district (approximately 18,000 residents in Kaimuki). These proposed maps would now split our Neighborhood Board map between THREE house districts.

Moreover, the proposed District 18 has a "peninsula"-shaped appendage that cuts into what was formerly District 19, just far enough to include the sitting incumbent, which would put him in a race against the incumbent in District 18.

Such line drawing would seem to be in violation of the Hawaii State Constitution Article IV section 6 to unduly favor a person or political faction.

As for cohesiveness, it has created so many districts and jagged lines in the Kaimuki area, I can probably set foot into 5 different districts in a less than an hour walk. Such a configuration will undoubtedly confuse my community.

Please see my amateur map demonstrating this at the end of my testimony.

Aloha, my name is Penelope Parnes and I am an Ewa Beach resident. I am submitting written testimony requesting that the members of this Reapportionment Commission avoid any effort to redraw district boundary lines to favor one individual or to punish another. Rather, I request that the Reapportionment Commission use this opportunity to engage in fair decision making to the benefit of the respective communities potentially affected. I understand that every 10 years district lines must be redrawn due to population changes and that this reapportioning is essential as it ensures every resident receives equal representation. However, it is also important to keep communities whole, as these communities share interests and policy concerns unique to their respective community. Consequently, each community must be considered individually in an effort to ascertain the most effective course of action for that community.

Specifically, maintaining its mauka to makai district may work best for Pearl City; however, what works best for Kalihi is to keep communities such as Kalihi, Palama, Iwilei and Chinatown together because these communities share similar concerns. Aloha, my name is **Trish La Chica** and I am a resident of Mililani Town, where I am raising my little family. I am a community leader, advocate, Chair of District 36, Democratic Party of Hawaii, and a member of Neighborhood Board #25 representing Mililani Town, Waipio Acres and Melemanu. While I serve in these various capacities, I am submitting my testimony as an individual.

I am writing to express my concern on the proposed map that continue to divide our Mililani community. While the H-2 freeway geographically splits Mililani Town and Mauka, we still consider Mililani to be one community with the same characteristics. Recent news reported the County Reapportionment Committee unifying the Mililani district into one community: https://www.civilbeat.org/beat/oahu-commission-approves-final-redistricting-plan-for-city-council/

The master planned community of Mililani and the 96789 zip code belonging to Mililani are currently represented by four state representatives and two senators. While I believe that our two senators work closely together to advocate for Mililani's needs, our state representatives do not. Having multiple representatives makes it very difficult and confusing for neighbors on opposite sides of the same street to have different representatives. Mililani is one of two master planned communities on Oahu and we are a single community sharing the same resources, schools, and shopping centers. The proposed map currently separates Waipio Acres, the oldest neighborhood in Mililani while Mililani Town and Mililani Mauka are split. Waipio Acres can only be accessed through Wainihi Street from Kipapa Drive and it should belong together with District 36 (35 in the proposed map).

Mililani experiences unique issues. One can only enter and exit Mililani through Kamehameha Hwy or the H-2. We do not have direct access to rail and majority rely on their personal vehicles to get around as we have limited bus service. Accidents on the H-1 will create backups that add additional hours to our daily commute. Aging residents have limited access to healthcare as many have to drive to town to see specialists. Residents of Waipio Acres have complained about having to cross H-2 just to get to their voting precinct at Mililani Mauka elementary school despite residents of this district attending Kipapa Elementary and Mililani High School. It takes Mililani Mauka parents 30 minutes to drop off kids at Mililani High School in Mililani Town as Meheula Parkway gets pretty congested. And there's only one lane to take the exit ramp from Mililani Mauka.

Mililani is in a beautiful Central Oahu district where neighbors know one another, children play and grow up together, and residents stay year-round, extending to successive generations. I believe it is time that our community is made intact again.

The plan to extend (Oahu) House District 51 from its existing Waimanalo base around Makapuu Point and Sandy Beach, then along existing District 17's Hawaii Kai coast to include the Portlock area seems suspiciously contrived.

The resulting outline of this proposed district seems almost as though Elbridge Gerry himself designed it. Other land more closely adjacent—if not already part of —District 51 is available for meeting its required population total. As shown in a recent design proposal, the Waimanalo-Portlock district seems almost a grotesque poster child for reapportionment abuse.

At a minimum, the commission and its political advisors owe the public a sensible explanation of why it considers this dangling configuration of a district preferable to more contiguous options.

Also questionable is the plan to cut away a portion of existing House District 18 while extending another part of that district's border for the apparent purpose of including the residence of a legislator in adjacent District 19.

Plans for redrawing these districts will reflect badly on the process if they are allowed to become law on a take-it-or leave-it basis without more justification to the public.

I'm aware of the *realpolitik* involved in redrawing legislative districts, that it creates gainers and losers and is bound to dissatisfy. (Lines can be drawn in ways that benefit some incumbents or challenge others to face colleagues in primaries.

Changes also can dilute the unwelcome influence of some areas by merging them with new districts where different interests prevail.)

Even understanding that, from experience here and elsewhere, I still think the commission needs to address the points I've referenced. Please make a more active effort to explain these unusual proposed changes to a skeptical public.

Aloha Commissioners:

Mahalo to the reapportionment commissioners, staff, and committee members for all of your hard work and dedication. I have several issues I would like to share that directly impact the interests of my constituents in Ewa Beach in particular, and on the Ewa Plain more generally. I speak not only on my own behalf but as the elected legislator for District 41 as I know many community members whom I represent share my concerns but do not have the time to offer testimony of their own.

The district where I have now had the honor of representing for three terms in the State House of Representatives has seen the single greatest population growth of any district in the entire state of Hawaii. We now have a 40% deviation rate in our population and obviously things will need to happen to accommodate our radical population growth, but there is some real shibai going on with these propose maps in the Ewa area and I see it as part of my duty as an elected official in this area to expose it and call for a restart to the process in our community with at least one new pair of hands drawing the map.

Leeward Oahu and the Ewa Plain has seen an explosion in population growth and thus should be seeing two things in particular with regard to new districts: first, a radical decrease in the sizes of the districts that cover our side of the island; and second, these districts should all be shrinking with a shift of boundaries to the south and to the west. The model provided by this committee does not do this but instead turns the district I currently represent (41, now 40) into a gerrymandered mess, and the district in which I have been placed (41 on your map) is created as a Frankensteinian monster district with bits and pieces of surrounding areas (a bit from Ewa, a piece of Kapolei, a chunk of Ewa Beach, some from the Nanakuli side) but itself provides no semblance of an actual community center and grabs radically different areas not even connected by roads and throws them together for partisan pollical purposes.

The intent of including certain areas in the new District 41 seems blatantly obvious, and while the ways that it could have been pieced together were many, the proposed map clearly, specifically and deliberately targets the sitting representatives in Ewa Beach (namely, myself in District 41) and seemingly Kapolei as well. I do not mince words and I fully intend to suggest in no uncertain terms that, at least with regard to the Ewa Beach area, this reapportionment process has been corrupt from the very beginning for reasons I explain below, and that the maps in the Ewa Plain must be thrown out completely and started over again.

What is more, the Senate District 19 lines are also very clearly gerrymandered for partisan reasons as it cuts out nothing but the most democratic section of the area all along Renton Road. This move now makes the district far more conservative than the community, as a whole, actually is. What is even more clearly done by this proposed map is that in the area I mention, the lines drawn to exclude areas in Ewa from Senate District 19 reach across a

railroad track to an area to grab the homes of former State Senator Will Espero and former Representative and Senate candidate in opposition to the current republican senator to remove them entirely form his district, even though there is no road even connecting the street where both Espero and Cabanilla reside with the Renton Road area used as a pretext to grab their street. This is too blatant and specific to be anything but obvious, and with the shameless intent of making it so that the current areas Senator, Kurt Favela, effectively has no possible viable future opponents moving forward. This senate district 19 map passes over any clear reasons or innocent explanations to explain these line choices and are also in direct violation of the rules of the committee, which are not supposed to target or favor current elected officials or candidates.

I shall now tell you the reason I know beyond any reasonable doubt that these lines in my area's House and Senate districts are not merely innocent and accidental exclusions, some of which are to be expected in any reapportionment process. The reason I know these lines have been drawn deliberately to target myself, Senator Espero and include others at our expense is because one of the commissions members actually told me to my face after that 2020 election that he would see to it that neither I, nor Espero, would ever be able to effectively represent Ewa Beach again. After defeating his daughter in the primary and the republican in the general, he told me he would "fix it" so it wouldn't happen again. At the time Commissioner Kevin Rathbun swore to me that he would see to this, I had no idea what he was actually talking about and figured he was just upset about losing again. You see, he has served as the de facto campaign manager for my opponents in the last two elections, and if I understand things correctly, for whatever personal reasons has gone out of his way to work on the campaign of every opponent I have ever had since my first successful campaign to represent the Ewa Beach area in the state legislature in 2014. That is, of course, his right. However, when I learned he was actually on the reapportionment commission and he was informing me that he would be deliberately shaping the lines specifically to do the one thing he had been unable to do in so many different free and fair elections, Commissioner Kevin Rathbun crossed a clear line that invalidates this map and creates the opportunity for a successful court challenge to frankly any map which he has a hand in drawing.

As soon as I learned of his membership on the commission, I immediately reached out to the commission chair and the elections commission chair for a meeting to inform them of this blatant violation and clear conflict of interest. While they listened attentively and sincerely expressed that I had perhaps a good reason to be concerned, they essentially shrugged their shoulders and said they would "keep an eye" on him, but other than that there was nothing they would do about it. When I met with them the commission had not yet even had any substantial meetings yet, and so it was proposed that perhaps Rathbun be placed on the rules committee instead of the one that draws the actual lines, but that proposal was not even considered as far as I know – this despite the fact that there seems to have been some disagreement between Rathbun and the other Fevela appointee as to which of them should serve on the rules or lines committee. Essentially, they seem to have acknowledged that while this creates the obvious appearance of corruption and favoritism if people found out about it, there was nothing that they would do about it. Perhaps all three of them thought I would just remain silent about this, but I will not stand by while obvious corruption takes place that only furthers serve to erode the public's trust in government and our elections. The people of Hawaii and the people of Ewa and Ewa Beach deserve better than this.

In order for the reapportionment commission to ensure that they stand by the rules and expectations of the community, maintain integrity, and preserve the public's trust in its

processes, I propose that Commissioner Kevin Rathbun should resign immediately from the state's reapportionment commission, or at minimum be removed and his position on the committee that draws the lines be replaced by some other member – preferably a member who has not openly threatened – and seemingly followed through on his threats to target an elected official with official action that violates the expectations of our community with regard to the sacred duty entrusted to this commission. I had privately proposed similar action be taken months ago but was ignored. I now publicly call for his removal and that lines in the Ewa Beach area be revisited anew from scratch.

On a broader note, with this current proposed map, unfortunately, we do not see as radical a shift in the proposed lines on the West side. They should have shifted much more radically to the West and to the South. The hand-colored maps I provide offer simple solutions with no thought to where anyone lives because it merely shrinks district (as they all must shrink on our side) to the West (as they all most shift to the West) and to the South (as they all must also shift to the South). The specific roads used matter little, it's a demonstration of principal and it only took 10 minutes to figure it out with the software on the commission's website. It is not difficult to do the right thing in this instance. There are elegant and simple solutions to maintain community integrity when you don't factor in who lives where; it is far more difficult to twist and turn and manufacture political spin to justify the Frankensteinian map that was put out by the commission. The integrity of our democracy rests in your hands, commissioners. Do not take the burden placed upon you so lightly as to bend to the whims of vendetta politics.

I believe the other two maps I provide speak for themselves. One shows House District 39, 40 and 41 and how the natural pressure from the shift of population should simply and unalterably shrink the districts to the South and to the West. Such elegant and simple lines show no favoritism or targeting of anyone while also clearly preserving communities. The other (more sloppy one) simply shows the old lines and how it would change 39 and 40 in the proposed map. Again, the details shouldn't matter if you are following the rules and simply shrinking and shifting the districts in our area south and to the west. It is not difficult unless you're trying to do something other than following the rules and expectations of our communities.

Lastly, a more reasonable line for what is now labeled district 40 is to have the south border drawn either the same as the city council lines in that area, or all the way along Papipi road as this also then follows the entire dividing line used for the community for the two middle schools (which is Fort Weaver Road and Papipi Roads). This enables the representative for both sides to be able to focus on their schools needs and those communities more fully and attentively as well. To this point, we see a much simpler issue, namely, that *none* of the legislative districts anywhere, including the one in which I reside in should ever have "tails." The current model for my area has a tail inexplicably preserved in the Southeast of the proposed 40th district where once the north to south line gets within one block from the Ocean it then dramatically shifts man

y bocks to the East at the last second to grab some homes along that one specific block of road - for no clear lo

gical reason according to the rules. The reason however is extremely clear, at the end of that tail is where the

favored republican candidate for that district lives, and which republican appointed

commissioner Rathbun clearly has advocated in an attempt to hand a partisan victory without having a real or fair electoral challenge by drawing me our and drawing him in; districts are simply not allowed to be drawn and should not be drawn for such obvious and corrupt reasons.







The State of Hawaii Reapportionment Commission, which is responsible for developing the Legislative Redistricting Plans for the Senate and House of Representatives based on the 2020 United States Census, has now posted on its **website** (see link below) the first set of proposed redistricting maps for public consideration.

Most surprising for our area is a proposal to divide Manoa Valley into TWO House

Districts! Almost all of Manoa Valley is currently within **District 23**; the proposal would divide Manoa into **Districts 20 and 24**. (See links to **maps** below.) HD20 would stretch into Kapahulu and Diamond Head. HD24 would include the western half of lower Manoa with Makiki.

I *oppose* this proposal to divide Manoa between two House Districts. As much as possible, Manoa Valley should be maintained as a contiguous whole, especially in consideration of its geographic characteristics and community interests.

Mahalo to the reapportionment commissioners, staff, and committee members for all of your hard work and dedication. I have several issues I would like to share that directly impact the interests of Ewa Beach residents, and on the Ewa Plain more generI speak not only on my own behalf but as the

The district where I live has seen the single greatest population growth of any district in the entire state of Hawaii. We now have a 40% deviation rate in our population and things will need to happen to accommodate our explosive population growth. However, the proposed maps for the Ewa area

Leeward Oahu and the Ewa Plain have seen an explosion in population growth and two things in particular with regard to new districts: first, a radical decrease in the sizes of the districts that cover our side of the island; and second, these districts should all be shrinking with *a shift of boundaries to the south and to the west*. The model provided by this committee *does not* do this but instead turns the district I currently represent (41, now 40) into a gerrymandered mess, and the district in which I have been placed (41 on your map) is created as a Frankensteinian monster district with bits and pieces of surrounding areas (a bit from Ewa, a piece of Kapolei, a chunk of Ewa Beach, some from the Nanakuli side) but itself provides no semblance of an actual community center and grabs radically different areas not even connected by roads and throws them together for partisan pollical purposes.

The intent of including certain areas in the new District 41 seems blatantly obvious, and while the ways that it could have been pieced together were many, the proposed map clearly, specifically and deliberately targets the sitting representatives in Ewa Beach. In regards to the Ewa Beach area, this reapportionment process has been corrupt from the very beginning for reasons I explain below, and that the maps in the Ewa Plain must be thrown out completely and started over again.

What is more, the Senate District 19 lines are also very clearly gerrymandered for partisan reasons as it cuts out nothing but the most democratic section of the area all along Renton Road. This move now makes the district far more conservative than the community, as a whole, actually is. What is even more clearly done by this proposed map is that in the area I mention, the lines drawn to exclude areas in Ewa from Senate District 19 reach across a railroad track to an area to grab the homes of former State Senator Will Espero and former Representative and Senate candidate in opposition to the current republican senator to remove them entirely from his district, even though there is no road even connecting the street where both Espero and Cabanilla reside with the Renton Road area used as a pretext to grab their street. This senate district 19 map passes over any clear reasons or innocent explanations to explain these line choices and are also in direct violation of the rules of the committee, which are not supposed to target or favor current elected officials or candidates.

On a broader note, with this current proposed map, unfortunately, we do not see as radical a

shift in the proposed lines on the West side. They should have shifted much more radically to the West and to the South. The hand-colored maps I provide offer simple solutions with no thought to where anyone lives because it merely shrinks district (as they all must shrink on our side) to the West (as they all most shift to the West) and to the South (as they all must also shift to the South). The specific roads used matter little, it's a demonstration of principal and it only took 10 minutes to figure it out with the software on the commission's website. It is not difficult to do the right thing in this instance. There are elegant and simple solutions to maintain community integrity when you don't factor in who lives where; it is far more difficult to twist and turn and manufacture political spin to justify the Frankensteinian map that was put out by the commission. The integrity of our democracy rests in your hands, commissioners. Do not take the burden placed upon you so lightly as to bend to the whims of vendetta politics.

A more reasonable line for what is now labeled district 40 is to have the south border drawn either the same as the city council lines in that area, or all the way along Papipi road as this also then follows the entire dividing line used for the community for the two middle schools (which is Fort Weaver Road and Papipi Roads). This enables the representative for both sides to be able to focus on their schools needs and those communities more fully and attentively as well.

Thank you for taking this seriously and hopefully addressing the concerns shared herein on behalf of the Ewa Beach community.

I have participated as the Chair and Spokesman for the Kaka'ako Makai Community Planning Advisory Council and worked with the Hawaii Community Development Authority (HCDA in the creation and approval of the Kaka'ako Makai Master Plan 2010. The master planning process encompassed a large participation group with several environmental and community groups and many individual participants from all areas of Oahu and the state of Hawaii.

Both Kaka'ako Mauka and Makai form a contiguous neighborhood with deep cultural and historical roots. It is for this reason that the state, in 1978, created the Hawaii Community Development Authority (HCDA) to ensure the stewardship of this urban district.

The Commission's proposed plan has maintained the community district's integrity for Senate District 12. However, for the House District, your plan carves out the Ewa-Makai area, shifting Kaka'ako Makai into House District 27 — Downtown/Kalihi — and away from Kaka'ako Mauka.

For the continued development of the Kaka'ako Community Development District, it is imperative that the total community – Mauka and Makai – remain within the Kaka'ako House District. It does not make sense to portion off Kaka'ako Makai as there is no resident population in Makai because residential buildings are prohibited by law.


I ask that you please retain the integrity of the Kaka'ako Community Development District within one House and one Senate district as currently structured.

In my opinion, the goal of this exercise should not be to provide preference to any one community over another, or to help some legislators keep their seats while gerrymandering others out of theirs.

The goal of the exercise should be to come up with a balanced map that makes the most sense possible, while recognizing that the population growth our communities are experiencing is going to force some changes that not everyone will be entirely happy with. As stewards of the Kaiwi Coastline, we believe that Makapu'u Point represents a natural geographic boundary between the Hawai'i Kai and Waimanalo, Enchanted Lake communities consistent with Article IV, Section 6 of the Hawai'i Constitution, which provides, in relevant part, that districts shall be "contiguous", and "compact", and follow "clear geographical features, and, when practicable, shall coincide with census tract boundaries."

Our community has spent over 45 years across multiple generations to protect the Kaiwi Coastline mauka to makai. The Ka Iwi Coalition is part of the same group of community members who led the successful Save Sandy Beach Movement in the 1980s and fought to preserve the entire Maunalua-Makapu'u corridor over the past 40 years. The Ka Iwi Coalition's success and ability to continue stewarding the Kaiwi Coastline is dependent on coherent elected representation that reflects the natural coastal landscape and the people who resides in our community. Specifically, the proposed configuration of House District 51 will dilute the voices of the Queen's Gate, Koko Kai, Kalama Valley and Portlock communities — neighborhoods that comprise an integral fabric of the Hawai'i Kai community in the current configuration of House District 17. Similarly, the Native Hawaiian voices of the Waimanalo community and Enchanted Lake neighborhood should not be siloed from the Windward Coast.

Our concerns mirror the testimony submitted by the Chairs of the Waimanalo and Kailua Neighborhood Boards, and Hawai'i Kai Neighborhood Board Resolution No. 21-3 – All the neighborhoods that comprise of the proposed House District 51 urge Reapportionment Commission Technical Group to maintain Makapu'u Point as the natural geographic boundary between House Districts 17 and 51 that separates Hawai'i Kai and Windward communities.
